OPENING SHOTS FIRED IN CAMPAIGN AT WATERLOO

Mayor McBride of Brantford Would Support Sir Adam Beck Were he (Beck) Opposed by a Labor Candidate.

HEARST GOVERNMENT ROUNDLY SCORED.

The mass meeting held last evening in the Town Hall in the interests of Mr. Geo. Hinchey, the Independent Labor Candidate was attended by a large number of ratepayers, which comfortably filled the body of the hall and although the weather was close and sultry they listened with keen interest to all that the speakers had to say. Mr. Geo. Hinchey, who acted as chairman called the meeting to order at 8:30 o'clock and in his opening remarks said that the meeting had been advertised that the first shots were going to be fired tonight and that the shots would be heard not only in North Waterloo but all over Ontario as well.

He was followed by Mr. Chas. Massel, campaign chairman of L.L.P. of North Waterloo, who read the platform of the party explaining as he came to each clause of the benefits to be derived by electing a candidate who would introduce to the Legislature and fight for principle that were only just and right. He punctuated his remarks with many hot shots at the Hearst Government.

His explanation of the different planks was forceful and clear cut. Mr. Dornier, in opening his remarks, said that he had not cast a vote for over 15 years the reason being that there did not seem to be any difference between the Liberal and Tory party, one was a bad as the other and he could not conscientiously support either one of them. He compared present day conditions with conditions of the olden days using many bible verses to illustrate his point. His address was well received.

Candidate Well Received.
When the candidate was called upon he was given a fine ovation. He said he did not intend to make any lengthy address preferring to leave that to those to follow. One thing he did wish to say however, was that he hoped in the coming campaign everyone would be fair and above board. He said a fair campaign should be one in which no unfairness or any slanderous statements made he would defend himself and the L.L.P. to the very utmost. In conclusion he said he did not consider himself a better man than any present but one thing he was sure of, that was that the platform of the Labor party was better than all the other platforms put together.

He scored the Hearst Govt. unmercifully on the nickel scandal stating that Premier Hearst knew full well when he held the position of minister of Lands, who the Mounds International Nickel Co. of Sudbury were. If Hearst don't know I am willing to give him the same information I am giving you tonight. Mayor McBride also touched on the gravity of the situation in Canada, England the United States was due to the terrible struggle we have come through the past 4 or 5 years. He traced the course of the war from its inception to the logical conclusion was that the war was caused through greed and the feigning of the Almighty dollar. Central Europe has learned a lesson, France has learned a lesson and likewise Great Britain. They have learned that commerce is the life of the nation but it was the man power and women power that Great Britain had to depend on in the final analysis. Greed, avarice, hate and envy are the greatest curses in the world to day. Greed, or in other words, gold has no religion, no politics, no conscience and only one language.

Scored Union Govt.
He scored the Union Govt. backing up his argument by saying that it was principally the Union Trust Company of Toronto which created much laughter. During election the two political parties put one another to pieces and then when parliament is on they mingle together and sleep together. The speaker dwelt at some length on the national debt of the country. He touched on the financial situation and showed how conditions could be improved and the cost of living come down were the government to live up to and enforce "the defense of the Realm Act", which was put into force in Great Britain, and we as part and parcel of the Motherland are entitled to the same provisions as the Mother country enjoys. The speaker claimed it is not necessary to appoint commissions to investigate the high cost of living for even when the commission hand in a report the government reverses the decision.

Lauded Sir Adam Beck.
Mayor McBride had a good word to say for Sir Adam Beck and at the mention of his name the audience applauded vociferously showing the hold Sir Adam has on the electors of this riding. Sir Adam, continued the speaker, has done more for Ontario than any other man in public life. His Hydro electric policy has been the greatest asset Ontario has ever had and because he has had the courage to come out and declare that he would not be the tool of any political party a dead set has been made against him in his riding. I believe and I think the labor party believes that Sir Adam should not be opposed by a labor candidate. How-

Mofe Bogus Checks in London
Despite frequent warning by the police, London merchants continue to have bogus checks passed on them and one of these artists visited a number of downtown stores again yesterday and succeeded in getting good money for his worthless paper on local banks. The police claim that during the past few months several bogus check artists have visited London and the merchants are being urged not to accept checks from strangers without first calling up the bank upon which the note is issued.

In most cases the crook makes small purchases and gets considerable cash in exchange. The checks are usually made on London banks and in the majority of cases the man who passes them has never been to the bank. It usually takes a day to find that the check is worthless, as it must be sent to the bank and returned, by which time the man who passed it can be several hundred miles away.

Efforts to Get Memorial.
Messrs. A. W. J. Mahood, A. W. J. Mahood, O.H. Vogt, E.G. Wain, P. Bristow, J. J. Jones, George Klinek, Reeve Stumpf and Councillors A. Winger and John Small attended the meeting on Tuesday evening at Conestoga, when the Council of the Township of Woolwich were waited on by the Elmira Village Council and several members of the Elmira Board of Trade.

It is "Christ not Religion" that saves says Dr. Conant.

Religion has never saved man yet and never will, said Dr. Conant yesterday in beginning his address: "Will religion people go to heaven?" "It is religion that saves, it is Christ. I do not read in the Bible that he that hath religion hath life, but he that hath the Son hath life. Christianity is not a religion, it is a Person and that Person is the Son of God."

"Satan is the author of all the religions of the world and the central principle of all of them is self improvement apart from the will of God."

"Satan is engaged in the uplift, not in the degradation of humanity. He did not propose to Eve that she should become like the beasts, but that she would be as God-dominating good and evil." But he proposed that she should be, thus apart from the will of God.

"The devil is not busy in the slums. He is busy where God is. He never goes near the slums until God goes to work there. He is busy in Colleges, universities, theological seminaries, churches, revival meetings etc. He resisted righteous Job, the high priest Joshua, the Lord Jesus. The wicked have the virus of evil within themselves. Out of the heart of man come forth all evil thoughts, says Jesus Christ. The wicked would do evil, even if Satan were bound. The devil is busy about the ones who are following God."

"He is busy setting before people high and noble aspirations, and then tries to get them to strive after these things apart from God, apart from his program and power. He does this by setting before them these ideals in the form of religion."

But we can never hope to become like God apart from this program and power. It is the power of Christ that saves and that brings man into the life that is right and pleasing to God. It is Christ who saves and not religion."

RAILWAYMEN AND OUTSIDE STRIKES

Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees So Decided.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—Probability of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees participating in sympathetic strikes was minimized today at the session in St. Patrick's Hall, when the convention voted that members would only be permitted to take part in such strikes on a two-thirds vote of all members and then only with the approval of the grand president.

The convention voted to drop the color line to admit colored railroad employees to membership on the same basis as white employees, but separate local divisions at different points will be organized for the colored employees. The order of Sleeping Car Porters will now nominally cease to exist, the members being admitted to full membership in the C. B. of R. E.

A resolution of sympathy with and endorsement of the stand of the British railroad strikers will be moved at this

afternoon's closing session of the convention.

The convention also voted to continue opposition to the Dominion Express Brotherhood, which is regarded as a company formed organization, not truly representative of the employees' interests.

The Canadian Brotherhood will unite with the international on its terms or not at all and should an amalgamation be effected insist upon maintaining national autonomy in Canada.

ELMIRA DESIRES MEMORIAL PARK

Township of Woolwich Approves Scheme of Citizens.

Elmira, Oct. 3.—Members of the Elmira Council and a few citizens prominent in patriotic work, were at Conestoga on Wednesday evening to interview members of council of the Township of Woolwich, with the object of soliciting financial aid towards the erection of a monument in memory of the boys of Woolwich and Elmira who paid the supreme sacrifice for their country.

A number of leading citizens have decided on the new Triangular Park at the head of Main Street as affording a site on which such a monument could be erected and war trophies placed and the plot could be known as "Memorial Park."

The selection of this plot of ground seems reasonable as Elmira is the centre of the Township and the gates from town were cordially received by Reeve Koeh and his council who at once fell in with the idea of mutual assistance and a definite plan will be decided upon the near future.

KING IS READY TO DEFEND RECORD DURING THE WAR

Liberal Leader in Accepting Nomination Replies to His Critics.

Summerside, P.E.I., Oct. 3.—Hon. W.L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, yesterday formally accepted the nomination to the House of Commons as a Liberal in the by-election made necessary by the death of Captain Joseph Reid.

In accepting the nomination Mr. King dealt with the attempts which he said had been made to create the false impression that he had failed in his duty during the war. He declared that he had kept silent under the attacks because he did not wish to traffic in patriotism for political ends, but there should be a contest he would welcome as an issue his war record and he hoped to have the privilege of addressing the returned soldiers on this issue.

The meeting was attended by an audience of 5,000 and Mr. King was received with cheers.

IVENS BARRED BY CITY OF SARNIA

MAYOR ACCEDS TO DEMANDS OF WAR VETERANS.

Sarnia, Oct. 3.—The War Veterans' Association of Sarnia, Ont., today, when Mayor Nesbitt following his talk with a delegation of re-

turned soldiers announced that he would not allow the Winnipeg strike leader, who is now out on bail on a charge of seditious conspiracy, and who is seeking to raise funds for defending himself and seven others, to speak in the Sarnia city hall.

Previously the mayor had stated that he did not think it would be possible to stop Mr. Ivens if the latter wished to speak.

The war veterans were insistent that Mr. Ivens should not be allowed to speak here and the mayor should do all in his power to stop the speaker from using the city hall. The outcome of it all was that the mayor announced this afternoon that he would not allow Mr. Ivens the use of the hall to speak in.

Citizens are now using forming a committee to do all in their power to keep Mr. Ivens from even visiting Sarnia. Owners of a number of halls have stated that the doors of their places are locked to the Winnipeg man.

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In Canada Since 1900.

In answer to the charge of his political enemies that he had resided in the United States through out the war and had returned to Canada only to further his own political ends, he said he had never resided in the United States any time except when he was attending the University of Chicago for a year, and Harvard for two years, and that was 25 years ago. Since 1900 he had resided continuously at Ottawa. Such time as he spent in the United States during the war, said Mr. King, was in answer to special calls to assist in bringing about industrial peace in essential war industries.

Reviews Labor Work.
He reviewed his work done among the miners of Colorado and for the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Company and other big industrial concerns to support the contention that the services which he had been able to render industry and through industry the fighting armies at the front, were greater than any other soldier could have performed in a military way at his age.

A letter from the vice-president of the Bethlehem Company stated that Mr. King's assistance was evidently of great value in helping to win the war.

Mr. King also dealt with the need of greater control of Parliament by the people and of the executive by Parliament, and also with the attitude of Liberal Unionists, who, he said, have passed, were waiting to hurl from the power of the Government that is neither Liberal nor Conservative.

Wants to Know Canada.
Mr. King thanked the Liberals of Prince County for giving him the nomination, and expressed appreciation of the warmth and cordiality of the reception tendered him on his arrival last night. He realized the advantage of becoming better acquainted with the Maritime Provinces. He knew Ontario well and had visited the West several times and, in looking forward as assuming the leadership of the great Liberal party he desired to know Canada from east to west, from the first chapter of its history to the last.

In referring to the vacancy in the County of Prince which necessitated the by-election he paid an eloquent tribute to the late Captain Joseph Reid.
