Smashing All Records

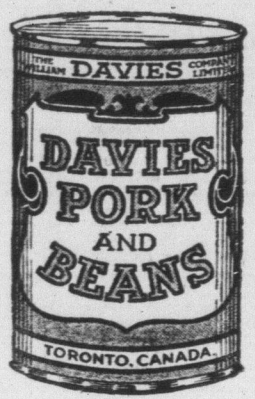
The knell of the musical German propaganda as "Die Wacht am Rhein" and "Deutschland Über Alles" was sounded the other day when more than 1,500 phonograph records embracing these and similar records were destroyed by a committee of women acting under the auspices of the National Phonograph records recruiting corps. FOR POSSIBLE REJECTION OF TREATY

PARIS, May 14.—Immediate measures tending to the further subjugation of Germany if its delegates refuse to sign the peace treaty were indicated today by the announcement that Marshal Foch had been sent to the Rhine by the council of four to take such action as may become necessary in the event that the treaty is not signed.

Foch at Front To-day

COBLENZ, May 14.—Marshal Foch is due to arrive here to-morrow. He is making a trip which is taking him to the different headquarters of the occupied areas.

The marshal will come here from Mayence and will be escorted down the Rhine by French gunboats. He will be entertained at luncheon by Lieut.-Gen. Hunter Liggett, commander of the American third army, and will then proceed to Cologne under the escort of British gunboats.

Consider Blockade

PARIS, May 14.—The Council of four, composed of David Lloyd George, M. Clemenceau, President Wilson and Signor Orlando, to-day considered the immediate reimposing of the blockade against Germany in case that country declined to sign the

peace treaty. The subject was under discussion at two separate meetings of the council.

On the other hand, it is anticipated that the blockade will be entirely lifted immediately if the German delegates affix their signatures to the treaty.

German Notes

PARIS, May 14.—The answers of the council of four to the German notes on prisoners of war and labor subjects were delivered this afternoon.

One of the later German notes, dealing with economic clauses of the treaty, declares that they mean the ruin of Germany if they are enforced.

A note on territorial questions protests particularly against the Sarre valley arrangement and the transfer of the Malmédy, Morenet, and Euten districts to Belgium, as well as the forced evacuation of a part of Schleswig.

A note on reparations does not protest against the payment by Germany for the devastation wrought in Belgium and Northern France, which it says Germany is ready to do willingly. It is added, however, that Germany will not pay reparation for this damage on the principle that she was accountable for the war.

The report of the committee on the German note regarding changes in the labor convention has been approved and sent to the Germans. Close scrutiny revealed several omissions. The council corrected one of those by deciding to insert a clause providing for the withdrawal of representation on the reparations committee on a 12 months' notice.

ONE LINE THAT WAS MISSED

Galt Reporter—"In gridironing this part of the country with electric railways Galt and Preston promoters slipped on one most promising enterprise through no fault of their own. It must be acknowledged. They had fulfilled their part in the enterprise in campaigning for bonuses for the project from Waterloo to Linwood, Welland and Crosshill, and in carrying everyone of the bylaws submitted to the various municipalities interested. To the construction of the line late Hon. George Clark and the late Martin N. Todd had committed themselves and this was an assurance of the materialization of a long-thought-of railway service for a rich part of this country. After all the hard work entailed in securing the support of the country north of Waterloo and when everything looked favorable for the launching of the enterprise an element in Kitchener—Berlin of that day—kicked over the traces with an injunction preventing that city from contributing the \$10,000 voted towards the project. This was Galt's opportunity. A deputation from that city rushed to Montreal and before the Canadian Pacific management laid their plan for the extension of the Guelph Junction Railway to Goderich Galt's proposition was accepted, and so it came to pass that the upper part of this country was in a measure cut off from the south by the Guelph-Goderich line. That C.P.R. branch will forever stand as an exhibition of the grass stupidity of a certain element in Kitchener. The northern city had in hand evidence of the value of electric railways' connection in the Preston and Berlin line and it is believable that if the injunction had been fought and the Guelph offer to the Canadian Pacific countered with a stiff assurance of a co-operated movement for a Welland connection as the first start of project having Goderich as its objective the Guelph proposition would not have gone through. What the divergence of the up-country traffic to Galt would have meant in the building up of this city as a junction point on the big system can be imagined let alone the value of quick

and reasonable transportation to and from our natural territory. Both Kitchener and Galt were caught napping while the Royal City acted—and Guelph deserves credit for the energy she displayed in the negotiations with the Montreal officials. She was alert and aggressive and carried off a prize that should not have slipped through our hands. The animating object of Galt's campaign for direction connection with Goderich was it is true an addition to the traffic over the city's line, the Guelph Junction Railway. Every pound of freight and every passenger to and from the north passing over the Guelph Junction pays tribute to the city; hence annual dividends of from
