did this time in Rimouski. Surely the people there don't propose to be humbugged forever.

I propose to speak to the people of Quebec as I speak to the rest of Ganeda. So far as my observation goes I can find no difference except this, that they give me a rather better time than is the oustom in other parts. I am glad to have your encouraging words that the campaign of prejudice is losing ground. Certainly I shall keep moving steadfastly on, labouring as best I can to gain the confidence of the people of your province.

You of course received my letter of Aug. 16 in reply to your previous letter.
