from the Indiana.

MR. ELLIS: I don't see that we can do enything here this morning with it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Go on to the next.

MR.BALLS: The next is Lower Similkameen Number 12 and 12A.

The only reference to a water right we have is a origerian oleim.

MR.RLLIS: Filed May the 3rd, 1920.

MR.BALLS; Yes. The Indians are irrigating about 26% sores on Number 12 Reserve.

MR.ALEXANDER: This is on Keremeos make Greek.

MR.BALLS: Yes. I suppose they can put in an application covering their irrigation requirements.

MR.ALEXANDER: Yes. I don't think it is worth it. It is overrecorded. There are only three or four at the beginning that get water out of it below that.

MR. NORRINGION: It ends up by supplying water to two.

MR.BALLS: Mr.Knewstubb says the water is all used close to

Keremeos Greek so that excess probably finds it s way

back into the creek. I am not familiar with it at all.

MR. RLLIS: Heve you enything to suggest, Mr. Ball?

· MR.BALL: I don't know.

MR.BALLS: The Indians were apparently diverting a good flow in August of last year, about two and a half subic feet per second into their ditch.

THE CHAIRMAN: I don't think there is any hope for you there.

MR. BALLS: The next is Upper Similkameen Number 2, Chuchuweyehe.
