PROCEEDINGS OF COUNCIL

Kent's Parliamentarians Holding Business Session at Harrison Hall.

Many Reports to be Dealt With—Other Matters of Municipal Interest.

The County Council resumed Saturday morning at 9.45. William Douglas, K. C., wrote the council desiring to correct some expressions made in a discussion in the council re inquests.

Mr. Rankin had referred to a case where two young men had been found, from the result of which one died. An inquest was held and Mr. Rankin had practically said that proceedings were taken improperly at an inquest, simply for the purpose of making money. Only the coroner or Mr. Douglas could authorize these proceedings. He didn't know the case Mr. Rankin referred to and didn't know whether it was authorized by himself or not. Mr. Douglas challenged and defied any man to say that he had ever authorized an inquest to be held except when he was informed that the interests of justice demanded it. In the second place Mr. Morrison was quite right in saying that he knew a case where the Crown Attorney had asked the coroner to hold an inquest and the coroner did not do so, at the request of the friends of the deceased. Such may have been a very proper course for the coroner to pursue, and it was the duty of every coroner, when asked to hold an inquest, to inquire into the circumstances and, if the coroner was satisfied that the deceased died from natural causes, it is the coroner's duty to certify to that effect. No doubt that was what occurred in the case Mr. Morrison referred to though he did not know what the case was. Many cases in the course of a year were brought up before the Crown Attorney, each year urging inquests, and he had to exercise reasonable care and judgment in respect to such matters. The Crown Attorney had requested Dr. Bray to hold inquests simply because he was the most competent and experienced coroner in the County and, instead of doing so, he has returned a certificate that he had investigated the cause of death and found an inquest unnecessary. This was in accordance with the statute. In the third place it appeared that Mr. Wilson, K. C., was not liable to pay for the burial of the unknown man upon whom Dr. Bray held an inquest recently. Now if Mr. Wilson had looked at the statute regulating such matters before giving his advice, the Crown Attorney did not think he would have advised the Township of Harwich not to pay the order given by the coroner. The Crown Attorney then quoted the statute and said that he did not think the law could be clearer on the subject.

On motion of Mr. Ross, seconded by Mr. Johns, the report was ordered filed.

Mr. Johns—We will have the coroner address the council and hear what he has to say.

The County Property committee reported that they had built a coal shed at the jail, repaired the fire pit and made the necessary repairs.

The tender of Wm. Anderson for groceries for the jail had been paid to the amount of \$864.17.

The committee had examined the furnaces at the Registry office and found that with repairs amounting to about \$12, they would do for a while. The report was adopted.

Mr. Robinson said that a man had been employed by the Registrar to attach hot water fixtures to the furnace at the Registry office.

Mr. Johns—Do I understand that he is doing this on his own responsibility?

Mr. Robinson—Yes.

Mr. Reynolds—If we did business at home like the County Council do it, we wouldn't have a single error for years. We had better stop the work or the bill will come up and slide through.

Mr. Johns wanted to know if any official was to be allowed to interfere with County property.

It was moved by Mr. Ross, seconded by Mr. Vester, that the Registrar should be instructed to stop the work and not to interfere with County property without the consent of the council.—Carried.

The Finance committee reported recommending the payment of the following accounts:

Town of Dresden, \$26.41. Sheriff Gemmill, \$76.46. Fraser Stambledon, \$1.00. F. Bedford, \$13.50.

That the account of the Township of Harwich for taking a lunatic, Annie Cummings, to the asylum, be referred back to the council of Harwich in order that said council may send in their account as the law directs.

That the grant asked for by Mr. Morrison to build a bridge over Jeannette's Creek be laid over for further consideration.

That a grant be made to the Kent Law Association of \$40, provided they keep the room clean and for telephone and stationery.

That a grant of \$25 be made to the six Children's Hospital, Toronto.

That a grant of \$150 be made to the town of Wallaceburg towards paying the expenses in connection with their two iron bridges.

That the \$1,000 asked for by Mr. Ross towards building a lock-up and post office in the village of Tilbury be laid over for further consideration.

That the account of Mr. Jahnke for the burying of an unknown man found dead in the Township of Harwich be sent back to Mr. Jahnke to forward to the council of Harwich for payment.

That the grant asked for by Mr. Sturgis to assist in graveling the Dresden-Camden turnpike be laid over for further consideration.

That Mr. McGeorge's request for the purchase of a cement testing machine be filed.

That the caretaker of the Court House, Jailor and Matron be paid arrears caused by reducing their salary on condition that the Government and city pay their respective portions.

That a copy of the picture of the council taken by Mr. Baikie at the June session be purchased and hung in Harrison Hall. The report was adopted.

Mr. Morrison objected to the grants to other municipalities in the report while the one to Raleigh was laid over.

Mr. Reynolds pointed out that the council were on the eve of a large expenditure for a bridge over the river in Raleigh.

Mr. Morrison said that if Raleigh had got a \$1,000 in the last two years that he would not say a word.

Mr. Somers asked Mr. Morrison if he wanted the bridge across the Thames?

Mr. Morrison replied that it was all very nice to keep that bridge swinging in the air as an equivalent.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The committee on Roads and Bridges reported that they had inspected the improvements to the Kent Bridge and had accepted the work at a cost of \$3,856.59.

Before the construction of the above work E. B. Langford and 67 others had petitioned that brick walls

That A. C. Shaw's account \$11.99, W. G. McGeorge's \$46.91, be paid.

That the communication from the clerk of Orford re the grant to graveling the county line east, be laid over.

That the communication of the clerk of Tilbury East, acknowledging the grant of \$100. The same had been expended on the town line, as well as a like sum from Tilbury East.

The usual grants were made towards the caretakers of the various county bridges.

The report was adopted.

Mr. Rankin moved that the report be referred back, and request for a grant of 1-3 the cost of the Bear creek be granted. Mr. Somers, seconded, but the motion was declared lost.

It was moved by Mr. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Rankin, that no grants be made this year to roads and bridges.—Lost.

The committee on Petitions and Legislation reported that in regard to the petition of John S. Gibb and 11 others re the transferring of a part of Bothwell to Zone, be referred back to see if the municipalities interested could not arrive at some settlement. That the council join in petitioning the government to extend the time for entering beet root sugar machinery free of duty.

That the Legislature be petitioned to amend the act governing coroners.

That the council assent to the resolutions of and join the Municipal Union.

The report was adopted.

The Printing committee asked that the account of The Planet, \$7.50, and the Banner-News \$53.16, be referred to the clerk and warden to examine and pay.

The report was adopted.

The Harrison Hall committee reported that they had accepted D. R. McGavin's tender for wood at \$4.50 per cord for hard, and \$3.50 for soft.

A steel flag pole had also been purchased for Harrison hall at a cost of \$115.

The by-law adopting a new seal for the county was passed.

The by-law regarding peddlars was also passed.

The license for a single rig was fixed at \$25, and a team at \$45.

The by-law adopting the Torrens system of land registration was also passed.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Somers, the Warden was asked to vacate the chair, and Mr. McCoy was asked to take the seat of honor.

Mr. McCoy then put the following resolution:—Moved by Mr. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Somers, that the L. V. Vinton, as warden; that the council had appreciated his earnest zeal in looking after the business of the council, and that in the future he ought to be able to look back with great pleasure on the year 1901.

The motion was carried unanimously, and was followed by the singing of "He's a jolly good fellow."

Mr. McCoy asked the Warden to receive the thanks and congratulations of the council for the courteous and obliging manner in which he had conducted the county's business.

The Warden said that it was not himself but the council that deserved the praise for they had always been found faithful and willing to do the work. He considered the warden's chair a great honor, greater even than being member of parliament, since the warden was elected irrespective of politics and by all classes. He hoped the council would have a better man in 1902.

On motion of Mr. Johns, seconded by Mr. Somers, the council adjourned to meet the third Tuesday in January, 1902.

WELDON'S FANCY STORE...

THE FARM REPAIR SHOP.

I often wonder how I got along without a repair shop, writes J. F. Thomas in the Orange Judd Farmer. The building needed was not expensive, but tight and warm. One end should be rigged up for blacksmithing. Build a hearth of stone and ordinary clay mortar, with a good-sized flue, about nine bricks to the round. An opening should be left at the proper place for the admission of a 5 or 6-inch stove pipe. Procure a blower or bellows, an anvil, a drill press, a vise, some dies and taps, 4 to 1 inch, for cutting threads, a hammer, tongs and two or three sizes of heading tools. Steel punches for hot iron are also necessary, but these can be made.

After some experience, many other tools can be made that come handy. Much of the equipment mentioned can often be gotten second-hand from machinists or scrap-smiths. Collect all kinds of scrap iron, bolts, old horseshoes, etc. from about the farm. Much useful iron may often be gotten for a trifle at public sales. Old horseshoes welded together and worked out are very useful for making nails, rivets, links for chains, etc. I have been using for several years a heavy farm chain made entirely from old horseshoes. As to the actual work in this line, many valuable hints may be gotten from a good-natured blacksmith. One may need instruction particularly on the working and tempering of steel. For a time the novice may be discouraged by his seeming awkwardness, but after he gets the set of his hammer and the hang of his tongs, some experience in welding, etc., there will be little repairing that need be taken away from the farm.

Put in the other end of the building a bench or table. Provide a cross-cut hand saw, fine teeth to the inch, a square, a smoothing, a jack and a fore plane, a brace with at least seven bits differing in size 1/4 inch, three or four sizes of chisels, a drawing knife, miter square and a hand ax or bench hatchet. A supply of different sized nails and wood screws. This will equip the wood-working end of the shop for all ordinary repairing. Many new implements can be made and ironed complete later. Now get or make a sewing or saddle's horse, procure some needles, wax and thread, harness rivets, etc. Put up a stove, fix up the harness and gather the plows, harrows and other implements that need repair.
