TO MOBILIZE ARMY.

BULGARIAN GOVERNMENT URGED TO ACTION.

Sixty Thousand People Reported Slain in One District—War Between Bulgaria and Turkey Near—Revolting Atrocities by the Sultan's Troops.

Sofia, Sept. 14.—According to information brought by a courier to the Autonomy, a force of Albanians, assisted by Turkish regular forces, acting under orders direct from the Yildiz Kiosk, massacred the entire Bulgarian Christian population of the Ohrida and Leren districts. Fearful descriptions are given of the sights seen there, the soldiers slaughtering men, women and children. The number of killed is not stated in the courier's despatches, but, according to reports from other sources, the total number of the victims will reach 60,000. Official circles are so far without information regarding the reported massacre, but, in view of the character of the latest advices from Macedonia, it is feared the news is true. Rumors are current that at a council of the Ministers to-day it was decided to mobilize immediately the first and second army divisions. This is officially denied, but well-informed persons do not doubt that the Cabinet, which is meeting in council daily, is seriously considering such a measure. A deputation of leading professors and representatives of the professional classes yesterday waited upon the Ministers and urged the Government to order immediate mobilization. Premier Petkov replied to the delegation that the Ministry was unable to admit the necessity for such a step at the present moment.

The Government appears to be firmly resolved to avoid giving Turkey the slightest pretext for declaring hostilities, and is doing its utmost to restrain the war fever. The situation, however, is rapidly becoming worse, and popular excitement is increasing. The Bulgarians are demonstrative and self-restrained, and are not accustomed to give vent to their feelings in popular demonstrations and noisy processions. Sofia and the country generally are outwardly as calm as in the most peaceful times, but people who know the Bulgarians say this calm is more to be feared than any outward evidence that they realize the fearful condition of their brethren in Macedonia.

London, Sept. 14.—According to information gleaned in various diplomatic circles in London to-day, the powers have come to recognize the fact that only drastic measures will maintain peace between Turkey and Bulgaria. No one taking part in the negotiations now denies that the two countries are perilously close to war. It is even suggested in a responsible quarter that the Slavs are working with the Bulgarians to convince the world that a frightful state of affairs prevails in Macedonia and that humanity demands the intervention of the powers. Strong pressure is being exerted on the British Foreign Office to cause it to take more energetic action to stop the atrocities on the part of the Turks, but the policy of the Cabinet continues to be confined to preserving the concert of Europe.

A pitiful condition of affairs still exists at Krushovo, where the wounded people are lying on the bare floor with their undressed wounds bound in soiled rags, according to despatches received here from Monastir. The Turkish officials now will neither permit a doctor to go to the town nor the wounded to be removed to Monastir for treatment. The wounded are mostly women and children. It appears that for diabolical reasons the women were especially outraged; how many will never be known, but a large number of cases have been fully authenticated. Many dead bodies were eaten by street dogs and their skulls and bones are still lying on the ground. The military hospital at Monastir is filled with over 1,000 wounded soldiers, the majority lying on the floor amid filthy surroundings.

THREATENED A PRISONER.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Chief Constable Prevented Committing Murder.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Sept. 14.—The city was thrown into intense excitement when W. H. Davey, a well known business man, was arrested on the charge of assaulting the daughter of Chief of Police Maloney. The Chief took the prisoner from his cell into his office and questioned him before the child. Then the Chief drew a revolver and aimed it point-blank at the prisoner.

Sergeant Lyons jumped upon Chief Maloney and knocked the weapon from his hand, but a second later the Chief drew a second revolver. He was overpowered by the sergeant and desman and finally taken by the sergeant and removed to the county jail in Lockport for safekeeping, as the sentiment against the man in this city reached an alarming pitch.

Advance in Flour.

Montreal, Sept. 13.—(Special.)—Owing to the prices now being paid for wheat out of the leading Manitoba milling concerns have advanced their prices 1 cent per barrel, making the price \$4.65 for patents and \$4.55 for second patents.

THE BRITISH CABINET.

RUMORS REGARDING THE SPECIAL MEETING TO-DAY.

The Report of the War Commission Has Raised a New and Important Issue.

London, Sept. 14.—A special meeting of the Cabinet has been summoned for to-day, and the political atmosphere is thick with rumors. These include reports that the Government will break up and that a general election will occur, or, at least, that the Cabinet will be reorganized. On the other hand, it is declared that no open breach will be developed, and that, with the exception of providing another office for the new Marquis of Salisbury, who, as Lord Cranborne, was Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, things will go on much as they were before. The original cause for the summons sent to the Cabinet at this unusual period of the year was the discussion of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's fiscal proposals and the preparation of Mr. Balfour's promised statement upon the subject. Since then the fiscal agitation has become of almost secondary interest, intense feeling having been aroused by the South African War Commission report, while public sentiment is also deeply exercised in the Balkan horrors.

Such a staunch supporter of the Government as The Pall Mall Gazette warns the Cabinet that it must take action to remedy the scandals revealed by the commission, while The Times, backed by the Liberal press, demands greater British initiative in putting an end to the massacres in Macedonia. In this connection, it is said, Mr. Balfour will see King Edward before meeting his colleagues on Monday. His Majesty has been taking an active interest in the Balkan situation, and the interview may result in some stronger attitude on the part of the Government.

Mr. Balfour himself does not anticipate any crisis arising on Monday to cause the Cabinet's resignation, though the antagonism of the Duke of Devonshire, Lord President of the Council, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer, C. T. Ritchie, toward Mr. Chamberlain's propaganda may create breaches which even Mr. Balfour cannot foresee.

The chief Whip of one of the political parties said to-day that the most acute politicians cannot forecast the approaching developments, but that the sanest surmise points to another period of uncertainty with the members of the Cabinet taking opposing views on the fiscal question, while the Government as a whole attempts to remedy for ill-effects of the war scandals in all branches of life, especially in business and politics.

It is announced that by the middle of next week the official papers showing the result of the Government's investigation of Great Britain's fiscal status will be published.
