dens, fancy balls in aid of charity, lectures and conventions; for museums and unique collections; for buildings we will not mention, for we would have to write so long to cover all of them?

Leaving the Exhibition grounds behind him, Fleming passed by the Army Barracks; passed the great shipbuilding yards, where vessels were now built for many countries; next by the long line of docks, near to which lay the mammoth warehouses and several sailors' homes; then by great manufacturing concerns,—many of them vieing with each other to turn Toronto Harbour into a chemical pond, and caring not for the complaints of the people so long as the Council saw and saw not; by the huge smelting works, whose
