the corresponding figures for 1915.

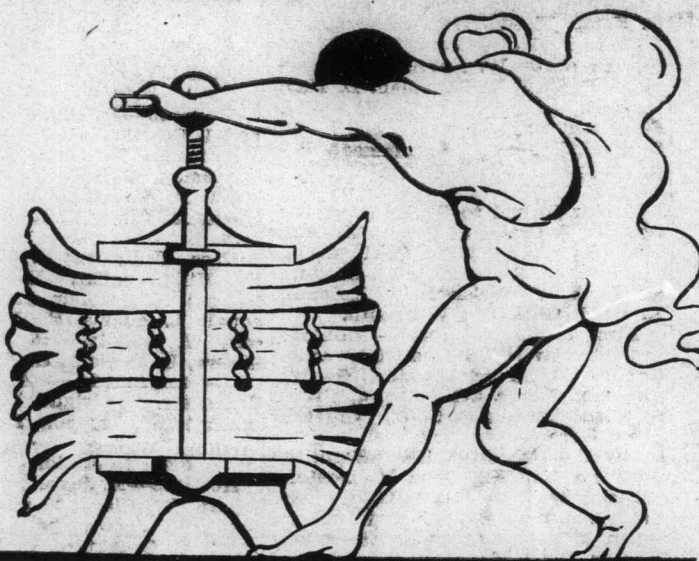
**NUPTIAL NOTES.**
