The list is far from complete and in order to enroll every name that should be there we ask our readers to assist us in the work. We have published the death of many more, at some time during the last two years but have not the time to read over all our yearly copies to obtain the information desired.

This week we take out of the list the name of Cyril March of Berwick, who is not dead but a prisoner of war. It is to be hoped that future events may permit us to remove others from the list of honored dead. We will add next week the name of Private A. West, the honored son of Mr. Zachariah West Halls Harbor who was ready to serve his country abroad but died in training at Kentville, January 23rd, 1916.

We desire to obtain the names of all who enlisted from Kings County and either while in training at home or abroad at the battlefront or in hospital from disease of wounds. Will our readers help us to obtain this list that we may place it before the proper authorities in Kings County in order that some worthy memorial may be made or kept to commemorate our honored dead.

**MATRON STRONG OF CANNING RECEIVED ROYAL RED CROSS**

A recent cable from Great Britain states:

"His Majesty came to London on Saturday and at Buckingham Palace invested several soldiers with the insignia of decorations recently awarded for gallantry. Among those invested with the Military Cross were Capt. Hon. Francis Grosvenor, Canadian Infantry; Capt. Graham Colmer, of a London regiment son of J. G. Colmer, the well known Canadian financier; Lieuts. Frederick Bird, Robert Dunsmore, John Harvey, Canadian Engineers; Arthur Rittson, Artillery; Alexander Campbell, Wilfrid Derbyshire Infantry. Matron Strong, of the Canadian nursing service, received the Royal Red Cross first class.

**LATEST WAR NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD.**

A London despatch tells of a raid of five German destroyers on the coast of Dover. They were engaged by two Dover gunboats. Two of the German boats were sunk and another likely destroyed. Over one hundred German officers and men were saved by the British from the boats sunk.

The British hospital ships Donegal and Lanfranc with wounded on board were sunk by the German pirates April 17th. Very few of the crew or wounded men were lost.

From the headquarters of the French army it is learned that the artillery fighting is taking place over a long line. The French are still making heavy gains and have reorganized all their positions captured.

The British and French together have captured 33000 prisoners and 303 guns since the recent drive started.

The German gunboats fired 100 shells on Calais, April 21st with slight damage. A few civilians killed and 12 slightly wounded.

Arthur J. Balfour, Foreign Secretary, with his companions arrived in Halifax last week and proceeded to Washington to confer with the United States Government.

It is believed that Austria is breaking away from Germany and will before long seek terms of peace. Cessation of fighting on the Italian front confirms this.
