Ontario Minister of Agriculture Thinks he has done Nothing to Injure our Agricultural Interests.

Toronto, Aug., 17 .- Hon. J. Dryden, minister of agriculture, returned from trip to the west to-day, and gave an interview regarding his interest in a ranch in Dakota. He said he did not see that he had done anything calculated to injure the agricultural interests of the Province. If he thought any injury would come, he would withdraw, but no possible injury could result. The ranch was only a pasture field, and required no personal attention from him.
"If I had foreseen," said Mr. Dryden, "that some narrow-minded peo-ple might object to my course, I then

would have refused to have any con-nection with it, as I do not wish to stir up the opposition of even the weakest of either party, but I have done it, with my eyes open, and do not intend to drop it on the suggest-ion of anyone adverse in originar." ion of anyone adverse in opinions."
