DEATH ON SKYSCRAPER

Collapse of Temporary Bridge Results in Man Being Killed.

Three Seriously Hurt—Accident Due to Gross Negligence—Contractor's Foreman Arrested—Structure Was Overloaded With Cement Bags—Five Minutes Later One Hundred Lives Would Have Been Sacrificed.

New York, June 14.—The collapse of a temporary bridge on the second floor of the sky-scraper at Cortlandt and Church streets caused the death of one man and the serious injury of three others. The police charge that the accident was due to gross negligence on the part of employees of the contractors, and the foreman of the cement gang was arrested charged with homicide. The dead man was James Pringle, 28 years old. Had the accident occurred five minutes later the dead and injured list might have been appalling, as more than 100 men were gathering to receive their time checks when the crash came. The police authorities claim that the bridge was overloaded with cement bags.

LORD'S DAY ACT IN YUKON.

Decision By Deputy Minister of Justice Causes Consternation.

Ottawa, June 14.—The Department of Justice has decided that the Lord's Day Act is applicable to the Yukon Territory, and that it is the duty of the officers of the law to enforce it.

For some time the opinion had been prevalent in the Yukon that the act could not be applied, inasmuch as its enforcement is entrusted to the "Attorney-General of the province," and the Yukon not being a province or having an Attorney-General, the territory would be exempt.

The Deputy Minister of Justice pointed out, however, that under the interpretation Act the Northwest Territories and the Yukon are specified as provinces, the Attorney-General, for whom is the Attorney-General of the Dominion.

There is consternation in Dawson over this decision, as it is contended that with the short summer season it will entail severe loss upon the mining and navigation interests to suspend work on Sunday.

Aged Lady Suicides.

Stratford, June 14.—Mrs. Patterson, aged about 70, drowned herself in the river near Victoria Park yesterday afternoon. Her hat and cape were noticed on the bank, and on search being made the body was found in shallow water. It is believed that she was in a state of temporary insanity when she committed the rash act.

The body was discovered while the river was being dragged for another person, Samuel Rankin, Norman street, who disappeared at two o'clock yesterday morning, and it was believed that he had drowned himself. He has not yet been found.

Late last night the body of Samuel Rankin was found by a party of searchers, in the river, near the house of refuge. He had committed suicide while brooding over financial difficulties. He was about 60 years of age and married, but with no family. He was a brother of the late Joseph Rankin, killed in the Guelph wreck.

Firemen Start Blazes.

Berlin, June 14.—A series of 43 fires in Siebenlehn, Saxony, extending from 1896 to 1906, by which 63 houses were burned, has been traced to the volunteer fire brigade there. The firemen used to be periodically rewarded for heroic conduct in extinguishing fires which they themselves had started.

Shot Man In Wife's Company.

Columbus, Miss., June 14.—At Carrollton, Jenkins County, F. B. Theron, a lumber dealer, was shot and killed by John Parker, aged 30, a prominent business man.

Theron and Parker's wife were met on the road near Carrollton. Parker, who immediately began shooting.

Killed by Foul Tip.

Binghamton, N. Y., June 14.—Albert Sheets died at the Lestershire Hospital Wednesday night, as a result of being struck with a foul tip while playing ball. Sheets was at bat and struck at a ball that glanced from his bat, and striking him on the head, fractured his skull. He lived 24 hours.

Laborer Badly Scalded.

Owen Sound, June 14.—Harvey Franks, unmarried, was terribly scalded by escaping steam. He was employed on a portable dredge at the Imperial cement works.

000 SEAMEN ARRESTED.

Russian Admiral Sifts Out Disaffected Sailors in His Squadron.

London, June 14.—A despatch to a newspaper agency from Sebastopol, says that Vice-Admiral Wren, who recently was appointed successor of Admiral Skrydloff, in command of the Black Sea fleet has sifted out and arrested the disaffected seamen at that port and placed 600 of them on board a cruiser under a strong guard of the Prager Regiment.

The seamen of the fleet are exasperated because no charges have been preferred against the arrested men, and it is said that a mutinous outbreak is likely to occur.

CHURCH REMAINS PASSIVE.

Anglican Synod Takes No Action Against Political Impurity.

Ottawa, June 14.—The Anglican Church, as represented by the synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, does not care to identify itself with a campaign against immorality and corruption in politics. At least, this seems to be the reason why a resolution proposed by G. C. Smith of Cornwall, and seconded by Dr. A. A. Weagant of Ottawa, was shelved without a vote yesterday.

The resolution read: "That the synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, now in session, deplores the immorality and corruption generally which recent revelations have shown to prevail in high places in our country, and considers it to be necessary to the well-being of the rising generation that the church in this diocese should make its voice heard in condemnation of such conditions. With this and in view, the synod respectfully suggests that the lord bishop be requested to confer with the clergy under his charge as to the expediency of expressing the church's disapproval in their several parishes by sermon or otherwise, and that the bishop, in his wisdom, be respectfully asked to issue a pastoral letter in this matter."

The motion was read on Wednesday and laid aside. Mr. Smith had to leave early for Cornwall, and placed it in other hands, but taking advantage of his absence yesterday the synod wound up its business without calling the resolution for consideration.

DR. SOMERVILLE TREASURER.

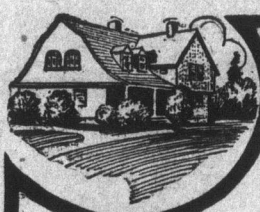
General Assembly Accepted Recommendation of His Appointment.

Montreal, June 14.—The committee on the appointment of a treasurer for the western section of the Presbyterian Church brought in its report.

The first recommendation was that Rev. Dr. Somerville be appointed to the treasurer's office. Since the resignation of the late Rev. Dr. Warden, Dr. Somerville has acted as interim treasurer, to the abundant satisfaction of the Assembly. In moving the acceptance of the recommendation Principal Scribner also moved that the salary of Dr. Somerville, not particularly as treasurer, but for all his duties, as clerk, be \$3,000 a year. Another recommendation asked that a financial agent be appointed and that the Rev. Alfred Gandier be asked to accept the duties of the office.

When adjournment came the recommendations regarding the treasurer's office had been passed, while that of the appointing of a financial agent was still under discussion.
