PUBLIC HOUSE TRUST.

Light on the Latest Unique Mo-ment in England.

ment in England.

A recent number of The London Daily Chronicle devoted considerable space to a presentation of the progress of the Public House Trust movement. 'It points out that the chief aims of the movement, it may be recalled, are to promote temperance by the conversion of the public house from a mere drinking bar into a genuine house of refreshment, and, secondly, to enable licensing magistrates to secure that all new licenses, with their high monopoly values, shall be administered for the public good. With these ends in view the association has been forming a trust in every county throughout the country, and is open to acquire existing licensed houses or to manage them for their owners. The leading principle of them all is the elimination of personal profit from liquor-selling; the dividend is limited to principle of them all is the elimina-tion of personal profit from liquor-selling; the dividend is limited to five per cent. on the subscribed capi-tal, and the balance is handed over to the central body for objects of public benefit.

public benefit.

It appears from the third annual report that at the end of 1903 the companies formed in the United Kingdom numbered forty-two, and although the financial statement showed a debit balance of £412, with a further contingent liability of £416, there is reason to believe that the indebtedness will soon be wiped off, for the membership has shown a regular increase from 406 in 1901 to 820 on March 1 of this year.

The registered companies have a subscribed capital of over £300,000, but in addition committees have

but in addition committees have been appointed in other centres to form new ones. In 1903 no fewer than forty-eight licensed houses—or nearly one a week-were secured, the total now being 130.

nearly one a week—were secured, the total now being 130.

Further, the promises of landowners to hand over to the trust companies of their respective counties the licensed houses on their estates, on the expiration of current leases, warrant the anticipation that the number of licensed houses that will come under trust management from this source alone will in the near future more than double the number of those already secured.

In order to give additional assistance to the local companies the executive determined to send an expert from time to time on a tour of inspection. In the first instance they accepted an offer from Colonel Crauford, who went through a greater part of England to Scotland last September. Here are one of two extracts from his report:

Of a house beyond the border, in Fifeshire, the Colonel writes:

"The first thing I noticed on entering the village was the splendid bowling green, costing over £1,200, provided out of the profits of the public house. A crowd of players and lookers-on were collected there. It is a well-planned, well-kept house, frequented by a better class of pitmen. The local shareholders are keen on the point of the Comof pitmen. The local shareholders are keen on the point of the temperance conduct of the house; the Committee of Management consists of honest, right-minded men, and the kelty experiment appears to me to be a very loyal attempt towards betterment. There are four other public houses in Kelty. They have all levelled up both as to quality and conduct since the trust house

and conduct since the trust house opened."

Again, of a trust house near Leeds, be remarks approvingly:

"The house was in former times very rowdy, and char-a-bancs full of Leeds people, drunk and uproarious, used to pull up there. When char-a-bancs come now the manager goes outside, and if he sees that they bring 'undesirables' he sends them away. A respectable class of regular workingman clientele in the tap-room. Trouble with these occurred at first, and many left, but they are now accustomed to the new conditions, and like them. Amongst excursionists and the better class of villagers the house is getting more popular every day. Workingmen drop in constantly for a plnt of tea or coffee instead of beer."

Working in unison with the trust is the People's Refreshment House Association, which has thirty-three houses urder its management, including the Waterman's Arms, Southwark, which was opened in January last. As to the success of this venture the association's report states:

"About 120 meals were served on the day of opening, and 200 on the following day. No fewer than thirty breakfasts were served on the third day to workmen alone, but the chief demand will probably be for cheap dinners, which can be obtained for 6d, including cut from the joint, vegetable, bread and sweets. On January 15, the first complete day, the sale of fold and non-intoxicants sxceeded the sale of alcoholics by £1. This is a good beginning."
