AT ROCKLIFE RANGES.

D.R.A. Matches Open Well, But Rain Fell in Interference.
Ottawa, Aug. 23.—The D. R. A. opened yesterday morning under very favorable conditions, though the attendance was not so large as last year, owing to the men from New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia not coming because the Government did not give passes over the Intercolonial. The morning weather conditions were also good. The afternoon shooting began with fine weather, but about the middle of the afternoon a heavy rain descended that, besides dimming the targets, made shooting very uncomfortable. The rain lasted during the whole of the afternoon.

At the first stage the sailors from the visiting fleet did very well. In spite of their not being in practice their team made an average at the first range of about 3000 yards. The 35. The lowest score of the team was 29. At the 900 yards range, however, they did not score so well, as they have not had any rifle practice at long ranges.

DAMAGING FIRE AT GLACE BAY.

Wash Plant of Dominion Coal Co. Destroyed at a Bad Time.

Glance Bay, N. S., Aug. 23.—Fire broke out yesterday morning at the wash plant of the Dominion Coal Co., near Port Morien. A tremendous northeast gale was blowing and although the large fire protection pump at the plant was got into service quickly the fire drove the men from the boiler-room and the pump was useless. The distance from Glance Bay is six miles and before the firemen arrived the plant was hopelessly destroyed.

The loss is at least one hundred thousand dollars. The wash plant has been used exclusively for washing coal to fill a contract entered into by H. M. Whitney with the Everett Gas and Coke Co.

The plant has been working up to its full capacity of fifteen hundred tons per day, washed coal being shipped from Louisburg. The loss will necessitate cutting down the output at several of the mines.

OCEAN MAILS.

Allan Line Holds the Contract—C.P.R. Unsuccessful Tender.

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—The contract for the carriage of the mails between Canada and Great Britain has been renewed with the Allan Line; this time for a period of five years from August next. The steamship company desired to get the contract for ten years, but that period was deemed excessive.

The C. P. R. Co. also put in a bid, but failed to score. According to report, the Minister of Trade and Commerce favored giving the contract to the C. P. R. on the ground that a still better service than the Allan's could give might be got, but the Prime Minister and Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick apparently were of the opinion that as the Allan's had the fastest existing service, the public interests would be best served by renewing the contract with them. The carriage of mails and passengers in 21 days is not improvable if the C. P. R. improve their Atlantic service.

WILL EXTEND TO WHITNEY.

Central Ontario Railway Will Spend \$25,000 For Desirable Connection.
Toronto, Aug. 23.—The receiver of the Central Ontario Railway was at Osgoode Hall this morning granted leave to spend \$25,000 on construction work to effect a junction with the Canada Atlantic Railway at Whitney, Ont.

Tried to Wreck Auto.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—George Arksey, a farmer's son of North Gwillimbury, was committed for trial by Magistrate Peter M. Ellis on a charge of attempting to wreck S. Frank Wilson's automobile by laying a rail across Yonge street August 13, "with intent to damage valuable property and commit an assault occasioning actual bodily harm." The escape of the Wilson party, consisting of Mr. Wilson and his son and Dr. and Mrs. Doolittle was providential.

C. P. R. Still Fighting.

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. has not given up its fight against location of the G. T. P. for the first 275 miles west of Portage la Prairie. The latest move is a renewal of its application, made on March 19, for a hearing in opposition to the G. T. R. location.

New Deputy Game Warden.

Windsor, Aug. 23.—Adolphe Pridmore of this city has been appointed a deputy game warden for the Province of Ontario and assumes his duties on Friday next.

WHAT THE PARADA IS.
