Waterton Lakes

A moonlight excursion to the head of the Waterton Lakes was taken a few days ago by about 75 people. An allnight stay was made; bonfires were lighted and refreshments served. Three launches took the trip.

There are now 17 launches and 58 tow boats at the Lakes.

During July over 7000 people visited the Waterton Park. At present there are more than 75 camps there.

Mr. Lilburn, leader of the Canuckers Jazz Band, plays his famous saxophone at the dances at Waterton Park on Fridays, Saturdays and Mondays. Dances are held every week night.

Mrs. D. Lynch of Pincher Creek gave birth to a seven pound boy at Waterton Lakes last Monday, a nurse from Chicago attending the case while medical aid was sent for to Pincher Creek.

At present there are 30 Indian girls from the Macleod Indian Mission enjoying the beauties of the Waterton Lakes under the care of the Rev. Middleton. While in swimming a few days ago one of the little Minnehahas was nearly drowned. She was rescued by E. Wagstaffe.

Not in recent years have crops looked so well in this part of the country. It is not safe to count crops before they are harvested, but there is nothing to prevent us from talking about it.

Apostle Ballard and party, accompanied by the Stake authorities, spent Thursday at the lakes.

The Gym Theatre, which is now under the management of J. S. Smith, is booking plays direct from Calgary. This is a better arrangement than heretofore and will be more satisfactory to all parties concerned. The booking for this month include two splendid offerings entitled "Over Night" and "Twin Beds." The Palace Theatre, which has more or less handled plays in the past, will devote itself exclusively in the future to high class pictures. With this object in view, the seating capacity of the theatre will be increased another 200 seats by taking out the stage and dressing rooms. Many other improvements are contemplated of which particulars will be given later.

At the ratepayers meeting in the Court House on Tuesday evening, it was unanimously decided to appeal from the Salt Case decision as handed down from Supreme Court of Canada, to the Privy Council of England. To settle the case at the present time would require between \$14,000 and 15,000, and as the cost of appeal to England will be considerable less than \$2,000, and as it was considered that the town had been given the wrong end of the decision on many points, the above motion was the result. As soon as the written judgment is received from the Supreme Court at Ottawa, it will be placed before the best legal council obtainable, and upon the advice offered, proceedings will be based.
