Headquarters for Nautical Instruments

Glad News Received by Minister of Shipping Last Night.

Just as the owners of the little steamer "Euphrates" and the friends of the six hardy men who composed her crew were about to give up hope of ever hearing of them, the glad news came to hand in wireless message from the Capt. of the British ship "Galileo" that the crew had been taken off the sinking steamer and were safe on board the former. The message which was received by the Minister of Shipping, Mr. W. H. Cave last night came from the wireless station at Cape Race where it was picked up from the "Galileo" and read as follows:

"Taken all crew off trawler 'Euphrates' in sinking condition Lat. 44.24 N. Long 45.27 W. Dangerous to navigation. Inform St. John's 'NID'."

JONES, Master Galileo. As soon as the message was received, the Department got busy to inform the relatives of the crew who were by that time consumed by anxiety for their loved ones. The families of Capt. Dawe and Fireman Taylor who lived in town were first communicated with after which the families of the three Portugal Cove men were reached by messenger, the De-

partment finding it impossible to get there to the settlement on the wire. Mr. L. Murray of Murray's Pond was got in touch with carried the welcome news to the anxious people.

The "Galileo" is a British steel service steamer of 3064 tons nett and is owned by Messrs. T. Wilson Sons & Co. Ltd. of Hull. She was bound to New York, from Antwerp so far as can be ascertained, she having left the latter place on Dec. 4th.

The Euphrates it will be remembered, left Bell Isld. for here at 8 a.m. on Tuesday Dec. 28th and was last seen about 11 o'clock the some forenoon off Flat Rock by the D. P. Ingham. Just about that time the wind was coming in from the South-west accompanied by thick snow. When it got too thick to make the narrow, it is evident that Capt. Dawe hauled his little ship off to wait till it cleared up but was caught too far off the land when the wind came off from Westward.

It looks as tho the crew were not taken off till yesterday as undoubtedly Capt. Jones' message would make known the fact as soon as the men were picked up, so that they must have had an unpleasant few days. The news that they are safe however will be received with general satisfaction and thankfulness.

The schr. Ariceen, loaded by Wm Ashbourne at Twillingate, has sailed for Malaga with 10,812 qtls of Labrador and Shore fish.

The schr. Roberta Ray, 40 days from Oporto via Channel, has arrived at Grand Bank with a cargo of salt to S. Harris.

MESSAGES IN BRIEF

Thomas Edward Hiller, a postman, leaped to his death from the high bridge at Rosedale Ravine, Ont., on Friday afternoon; the fall being about 200 feet.

France is likely to ask soon for a meeting of allied premiers to take action to enforce German disarmament.

Dr. Glover, of Toronto, who has discovered serum for treatment of cancer, is said to have received following offers to go to United States to follow up his work. A New York man has offered \$1,000,000 for the secret prescription and permission to put it on the commercial market, and a Chicago multi-millionaire, who has been afflicted with cancer and has obtained relief from Glover's treatment has offered to equip a cancer clinic at that city if the doctor will go there to manage it.

The German Ambassador called at the British Foreign Office on Friday to sign the Trade agreement, the details of which are to be published soon.

The protocol effecting the settlement of the Fiume question was signed Friday afternoon.

Six buildings, including the post office and three stores, were destroyed by fire at Arran, Sask., on Friday. Estimated loss, \$150,000.

The U.S. steamer Walkill is 500 miles off Northwest Coast of Spain with her engines totally disabled. The S.S. West Camah is standing by but other help is needed.

D'Annunzio and his legionaries will leave Fiume in 5 days, it was announced Friday.

Sixty-one persons, including eight white men were lynched in the United States in 1920 as compared with 83 the previous year.

Enforcement agents, blue-coats and civilian clad, cast a damper in the enthusiasm of the New York throngs who sought to usher out the old year and greet the new in the manner of anti-prohibition days. One prisoner was locked up after he pleaded with the officers to shoot him rather than place him in a cell.

An official bulletin has revealed that the last Sacrament of the Church has been administered to Cardinal Gibbons, who is seriously ill at Union Mills, Maryland.

King Constantine has made a request for an impartial investigation of Greek events by an Allied Commission, asserting this would be preferable to the present method.

Twenty-two persons were killed or died of wounds in Ireland between Dec. 22 and 29. The fatalities included 19 civilians, 5 policemen, 1 soldier. Seventeen persons have been arrested in Rome in connection with a plot by extreme Nationalists to attack the Italian army operating against Fiume.

The French government has handed a note to the German Ambassador calling attention to the fact that Germany has not fulfilled her engagements entered into at the Spa conference.

Friction is reported between Russian and Polish peace delegates at Riga.

Earl Reading has been offered post of Viceroy of India, and it is believed he will accept.

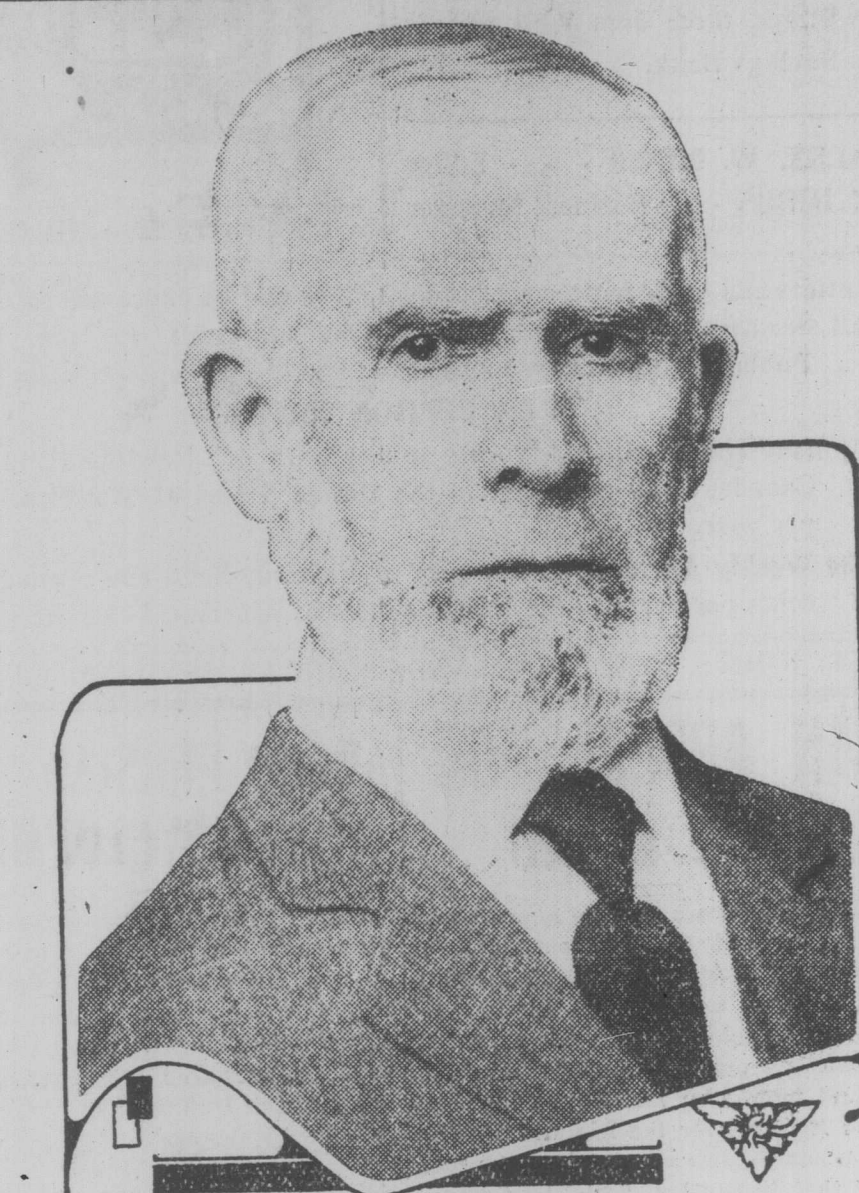
