LOCAL NEWS.

P. E. W. Moyer, of the Berlin News, has got the La Grippe.

Mr. R. M. Jeffrey, business manager of the Referee, Chicago, is in the city to-day renewing old acquaintances.

The special committee appointed by the city council to investigate the Medical street hill difficulty is in session this afternoon.

The weather probabilities read: Westernly shifting to easterly winds, fair weather, not much change in temperature, snow to-morrow.

Miss Powers, one of the lady missionaries who left Toronto on Tuesday for China, was taken ill en route, and is now lying at the General Hospital at Winnipeg.

Rev. Father Kelly, of Hamilton, has been appointed by Bishop Dowling to the pastorate of the Roman Catholic church at Galt, as successor to the late Father Lennon.

Messrs. E. & G. Presanis lost a horse this morning. The animal dropped dead at the C. P. R. freight depot while backing a load of flour into position to be unloaded.

THE STAR OF BETHLEHEM.—Astronomers say that the star of Bethlehem will again be visible this year, being its seventh appearance since the birth of Christ. It comes once in 35 years, and is of wondrous brilliancy for the space of three weeks; then it wanes and disappears after seventeen months. It will be a sixth star added to the five fixed stars in the constellation Cassiopeia while it remains in sight.

CHIEF ROSE'S REPORT.—Chief of Police Rose, of Dundas, has presented his annual report. He showed that 297 cases had been brought before the Magistrate during the year, of which twelve had been sent up for trial, and thirteen had been let under suspended sentence and the remainder fined with the option of going to jail. The amount of fines collected amounted to \$281.78. Five hundred and fifty-two tramps had been accommodated during the year. He recommended that some repairs be done to the cells and tramps' room, and thanked the Council for the courtesy and support extended to him during the past year.

ACCIDENT.—The Mount Forest Reporter says: "A peculiar but painful accident befell Coun. John Boos on Thursday. In the work of rebuilding the centre of the Union Block it became necessary to dislodge some loose bricks from the rear wall and the work was done by Mr. Boos, who secured a double barreled gun, and not being accustomed to that kind of work he discharged the barrels at once. There was a deafening report, and the gun recoiled heavily on Mr. Boos's nose, tearing away the flesh from one side of the organ, and knocking him over. A number of stitches had to be taken in the wound on the nose but fortunately no serious damage was sustained. Mr. Boos, however, has not been a good deal, and would no doubt have burst with possibly fatal effects.

DEATH OF MRS. GAUHAN.—The many friends of Mrs. Frank Gauhan will be pained to learn of her death, which took place at the residence of her husband, Mr. M. Sweetnam, at 7 o'clock this morning. She has been ill for upwards of a year, and bore her sufferings with Christian fortitude. She was a member of the Church of Our Lady, and took an active interest in all charitable work. Her brothers and sisters are: Messrs. Matthew and Frank Sweetnam, Mrs. Thos. Coughlin, Mr. Edward Sweetnam, and Miss Sweetnam, who, together with the bereaved husband, will have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. Her funeral will take place on Sunday, at 2 o'clock p.m., and will, no doubt, be largely attended.

A ROBBERY.—A robbery of no mean size has just come
