methods as growing nothing but potatoes in Ireland and nothing but wheat in Manitoba were not proper. He warned about waste on the farm, and urged more beautifying in this country, as in England and Ireland. He did not wonder that some boys wanted to get away from the farm; they should give the farm boys the best that was going. Canada would never be what God intended her to be until her young men recognized that this was an be what God intended her to be until no young men recognized that this was an agricultural country, and gave their bright-est and best to the farm. He extolled the resources of Canada, and the kind of men this north country ought to produce to make her the best and finest in the world. make her the best and finest in the world.
Men ought to be as spruce and spry on the
farm as in the dity; in the great conventions the intercourse between city and
country was beneficial. In the country
there was a chance to develop physically,
a chance to think. In most cases the best

achance to chink. In most cases the best men came from the farm; the farmers had glorious advantages to think for themselves, and not be parrollike imitations of others, as people were apt to be in the cities. Canada would be great if abe obeyed the great principles of the Word of God, as had Scotiand. If they developed the grand qualities of honesy, temperance, brotherly kindness, charity and industry, he saw no reason why Canada at some time should not occupy the first position in the world, as Great Britain did now. Mr. Patterson's racy and inspiring address was heartily othered.


