A FARMERS WIFE MAKES STRONG PLEA

But the Farmers' Difficulty is Only What Other Industries Have Been Experiencing.

The following letter well expresses the general attitude of the farmers of Carleton county and elsewhere. Their situation truly is hard. The whole war situation is hard. Hitherto the farmers have not felt the war situation except to profit by it. They have been protected while other industries have been drained of men during the last four years. They can supply insufficient numbers now. The farmers must sacrifice. There is no easy way out of it. To say it is hard is but a feeble expression of a mighty fact. And there is no one to blame but that infamous villain, Kaiser Bill. "A Farmers Loyal Wife" says:

If the government calls all farmers' sons from 19 to 35 for military service who are physically fit, what is going to happen? Starvation coming to the farmer as well as to our brave boys overseas? No substitutes can be provided by the Minister of Agriculture that can take the place of our experienced boys. Very few farmers in Carleton county today have more than a man and boy, and in some cases a man only. There is no farm but needs two able bodied men. Returned soldiers are practically unfit for hard work, and as to the city chaps, they expect to sleep in "spare beds" and be served with seven course dinners in return for the few chores they may, or may not, be able to do. Let those enforcing the M.S.A. take those boys who want to spend their vacation on the farm and fit them for service overseas. The Carleton county farmer has no use for such.

Last year the farmers worked over hours, and every hour, in order to increase production. What was the result? Not a few contracted debts. Potatoes yielded 30 barrels to the acre and fertilizer cost \$54 per ton. If the government disposes of officials drawing salaries and going about the country "instructing" the farmers as to his duty about production and take his salary for Red Cross purposes, or in helping the overworked farmer buy fertilizer for increased production, there might be better results. The farmer is a fairly intelligent animal, and a subscriber to many weekly and daily papers published throughout the Dominion in which instruction is given for increased production. The need of the hour is most distinctly understood.

I would like to ask how about Quebec? How many men are there to each farm?

If we have enough boys over and above what is needed for actual work, by all means let them go. The situation is grave. But there must be left sufficient men to provide food for the world's needs today. Give the farmer a chance and he will do his bit.
