Late Ontario market reports show a slump in the price of pork from 22 to 17 cents per pound. In the United States the price has been fixed by the government at 17 cents until February 1st and this will be the means of maintaining the price in Canada at that figure. After February 1st a further slump is looked for as there is but little demand now for pork products in the old country.

The farmers have become greatly exercised over the question of larger markets and high priced fertilizer. Petitions are being signed and already some of them have been forwarded to the government. The petitioners ask for a commission to investigate the high price of fertilizer and also ask that an embargo be put on all non-perishable goods until the perishable ones have been first shipped to Europe.
