Neither does it follow that because another man is a ship owner, he can navigate the Ship of State through stormy ways. Business men by virtue of their training, are mostly men of one idea. Rarely have they the ideas which representatives of the people should have. The question people are asking today is not about the tariff; it is how soon can we get rid of the pork-packing, ship-owning and paint-making politicians of the mercenary out-look, and replace them with men of a different and better calibre; men whose one aim and ambition is to extricate Canada from a difficult position, and place her on the firmest foundation of solid prosperity; men who are not actuated by the size of their indemnity, nor influenced by the interests of this or that clique; men possessed by noble ideals and catholic views; men who can see and act continentally. That is, men who can see the whole world in its true perspective, and then act for the best interests of their own home land. Men who will not run at the first sign of danger, betray the people, or sell their country.

SCHOOL TRUSTEES CONVENTION

Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, has called a convention of school trustees of the province on Thursday and Friday, November 17 and 18.

The sessions will be held in the Normal school building. Each school district is entitled to send one delegate or more in accordance with the subsection of the consolidated statutes under which the convention may be called. The chief superintendent will call the convention to order and arrange for the programme for the opening day.

Arrangements have been made for a school trustee familiar with teachers' convention in the west, to be present and address the convention.

Notice of the convention has been forwarded to all school boards and the complaint cannot be made that many were in ignorance of the calling of the convention. Delegates have been requested to inform the chief superintendent of their election or appointment.
