

other alternative but to treat them as rebels or banditti, ruffians, and take life for life and scalp for scalp. War was therefore declared against them; rewards being offered for prisoners and scalps. A reward of £25 for each male Indian prisoner above 16 years old; £20 for a female Indian; £20 for the scalp of a man and £10 for a child prisoner, was offered, and Colonel Scott, who commanded at Fort Lawrence in 1756, raised two companies of Rangers from amongst his men to carry on the war, and he engaged to ask the Governor to raise the price of scalps, and to have similar bounties granted for Acadian prisoners or their scalps, as they were acting in conjunction with the Indians.

In May, 1756, Gov. Lawrence issued a proclamation authorizing all His Majesty's subjects to annoy, distress, take and destroy the Indians inhabiting different parts of the Province wherever they might be found, and all such as might be aiding and assisting them, and offering £22 for each male Indian scalp, besides liberal rewards for Indian prisoners.

This extreme measure was forced upon the Government by the wanton unprovoked and treacherous murders committed by the Indians and their allies; and I then had no more repugnance to engaging in an expedition of extermination against them than I had against bears or other wild beasts which destroyed our property; so that when ordered by Col. Scott to take command of a party of men, and burn out and drive off an encampment of Acadians and Indians at Le Laie, I undertook the duty with pleasure.

I left the fort early in the morning, and accompanied by twenty-four men, under the guidance of a French guide marched on the military road towards Bay Verte until we passed Le Laie, and then struck off to the left by a path crossing the head of a French inlet, and made a circuit of the woods, and by a long detour came out beyond the lake. We crossed this before its foot, and discovered the dead and the dying lying unburied and unattended on the marsh of Le Laie, and believed that I had also been a victim. I remained prisoner at Quebec for three long years, and the first hope that of my release from imprisonment was when I saw the British fleet sailing up the St. Lawrence and anchoring opposite Quebec; but my heart sank within me as I contrasted the opposing forces. The French were numerous, better disciplined well armed and occupying an almost impregnable position and in a country inhabited by French. The English inferior in numbers and position, relying upon the genius of the conqueror of Louisburg, and the heart of oak which animated his soldiers. I feared the result for my countrymen, but while I was desponding, Wolfe achieved immortality, and Quebec was captured. With my freedom I went to Boston, then joined an expedition to Cuba. On coming back I retired from the army, married and came to Fort Lawrence, where I have since resided.

Colonel Moulton (said the Major) the name of Fort Cumberland the fortress he had captured—a which was subsequently given to township, and afterwards to county; and during the short time he remained here adopted every measure he could devise to secure confidence and good will of the people he had conquered. All his efforts were unavailing; for whenever of the soldiers of the Fort gave slightest chance they were surely shot or prisoners, if not shot and strung orders were passed commanding, and every person to prevent the men themselves; but their recklessness or which always never failed to take.

The Indians, influenced by French were on the war path, and Englishman could with safety go to town, and afterwards to himself beyond the range of the stations, or he was liable to be fired and scalped in cold blood.

Payzant built himself a fort on an island in Mahone Bay, N. S., from Ross Island, on which was a settlement. The Indians there caught a boy, and forced to show them where Mr. Payzant They killed and scalped Payzant, a woman servant, and the boy, and carried off four and four children to whom they were disposed of for ransom.

At Bay Verte, Lieutenant went out with a party of men, in order to get wood, attacked by Indians, and scalped nine and wounded one.

Men from Fort Cumberland had walked down on them, and were attacked by the Indians, one killed and the other wounded.

CLEANING.

In the last number of "London Society" there is a very interesting paper bearing the above title from the pen of W. Thornbury. It gives an account of the walls and the modern fortifications and legends of the gates and ramparts. The article concludes thus:

"It to Louis XIV, the patron of Racine and Molierre, Paris is indebted for her luxury, it is to the great Napoleon she owes the idea of her fortifications. The Citizen King zealously aided by Thiers, led to the carrying out, the design in 1861. One hundred and forty million francs were granted for the purpose, which took several years to complete; if indeed it is even yet completed—question which Prussian cannon will decide. With 500,000 men behind them, the seventeen detachments defending the approaches on the Mondelet system may perhaps keep the enemy at bay for a dozen days but hardly for more. According to five or six old official reports Paris had within its walls 2,238 mortars, cannon, and howitzers, 575 rammer guns, 200,000 muskets, 1,500 rocket tubes, 2,700 gun-carriages; but this were mere paper cannon, &c., for according to M. Gambetta's own proclamation, dated Tous, October 10th, the entrenchments last month only possessed 500 cannon; but now it is—as indeed there is such a thing as—cavalier truth in France—5,800 cannon with 400 rounds of ammunition for each. It this be so, and the men of Marengo and Austerlitz left my sons, the many a terrible beaten and unmercifully beaten for no other reason than the driver's order is not understood. If the driver in such a case should speak gently to the leader, pass him a few minutes on the neck to reseachum of his friendship, and lead him a few steps in the direction he wishes to go, and all this without any exertion or anger on his part, the leader will always do his best to please him.

In driving a horse to a carriage, however gentle and well-trained he may be, something may happen to alarm or frighten him; this is no fault of his; he cannot help it. All he needs is a word or two of encouragement, gently spoken, to reassure him of his master's presence, and that is all right. There should be no whipping done. The driver should resolve that he acts always too, sometimes, and would think hard for being whipped for it.
