TREATY BEFORE SENATE.

President's Letter Transmitting the Hay-Pauncefote Convention for Ratification.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5-Following is the letter of President Roosevell trans-mitting the Hay-Pauncefote treaty to

mitting the Hay-Pauncefote treaty to the senate:

To the Senate—I transmit for the advice and consent of the senate to its ratification, a convention signed Nov. 18th, 1901, by the respective plenipotentraries of the United States and Great Britain to faciliate the construction of a ship canal to connect the Atlantic and Pacific oceans by whatever route may be considered expedient, and to that end, to remove any objections which may arise out of the convention of April 19th, 1850, commonly called the Clayton Bulwer, treaty, to the construction of such canal under the auspices of the government of the United States, without imparing the 'general principles' of neutralization established in article eight of that convention. I also enclose a report from the secretary of state, submitting the convention for my consideration.

The text of Secretary Hay's report upon the treaty as finade to the president also was transmitted to the senate.
