HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Grand Trunk Pacific Bill
Before the House.

RESTRICTING CAPITALIZATION.

Ottawa, June 22.—The attention
of the House of Commons was directed to-
day with the consideration of the
Grand Trunk Pacific bill in the
committee stage.

On the opening of the House Sir
Wilfrid Laurier gave Mr. Borden the
information that he had prom-
ised to refer to the personnel
of the commission on transpor-
tation and the Grand Trunk Pacific
concession.

He said in regard to the
first of these commissions, the
House was already aware that his
intention was it should be com-
posed of Sir William Van Horne, Mr.
John Burtman and Mr. Harry Ken-
edy. Mr. Kennedy had signed the
bill, and it was impossible for him to
attend to the duties of the com-
mission, and therefore we have se-
lected in his place Mr. Fry, of Que-
bec.

In regard to the second com-
mission, that is, the commission for
the investigation of the Trans-
portation Commission, Mr. Borden
and other members in the House
concerned in the matter.

Mr. Justice Britton has been
appointed a commissioner, and has
accepted.

The Grand Trunk Pacific bill
was taken up in committee. On the cap-
italization clause, Mr. R. L. Borden
claimed that, according to the
amended bill, the company is au-
thorized to capitalize and bond at
from \$40,000 to \$70,000 per mile.
It had been stated in the House
that the construction cost of the
Canadian Northern prairie sections
would not exceed \$18,000, includ-
ing \$3,000 for equipment. Mr. Borden
said that the Canadian North-
western could build their prairie sec-
tions for \$18,000 a mile, he could
not see on what ground the House
should give the Grand Trunk Pacific
a capitalization of \$40,000 a mile over
some of its sections. He did not
think that the bill should be passed
unless the House was satisfied that
the promoters or by the Minister
why such a high capitalization
was required.

Mr. Borden pointed out that the
Canadian Northern had been au-
thorized to issue as large a propor-
tion of capital as that now pro-
posed for the Grand Trunk Pacific.
He said that this road was to be
built over some 3,000 miles, and
that of this 3,000 miles was through
very rough and expensive coun-
try. The section from Quebec
to Winnipeg, 1,500 miles, was
through an exceedingly rough coun-
try, that could not be built through
a prairie country, and then the
mountain section would be very
costly. Taking the mileage of 3,000
miles, and the cost of \$40,000 a
mile, it would amount to \$120,000,000.
He said that the proposed capital-
ization of \$40,000 a mile had been
authorized \$25,000 a mile, and the
proposed was no more liberal than
in the case of the Canadian Northern,
which had been authorized \$25,000 a
mile for the same route from Quebec
to Winnipeg was the most expensive
possible. They could not select a route
that would have a lower cost than
that of the Canadian Northern, and
therefore, throughout that section.

Mr. Borden repeated what he
had said in the Railway Commit-
tee, that he could not see the neces-
sity of the charter, and he did not
think that the charter should be
granted to the Grand Trunk Pacific
company.

In support of the granting of the
charter, Mr. Borden said that the
Government's idea was to build the
road, and if the charter did not
conform to the Government's idea
then the Government should amend
the charter. He said that the charter
should be amended or dropped. He
took it that the charter would not
become law until the end of the
session, and so it could be amend-
ed.

Mr. Borden suggested that the
bill should be referred to the com-
mittee of the House to consider the
policy of the Government.

Mr. Fielding said that this was
for the promoter of the bill to say.

Mr. McCarthy, in view of the full
discussion of the bill in the Rail-
way Committee, asked the House to
permit the bill to go through. He
said that the bill had been given
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able. The C. P. R. had a capital
stock of \$85,000,000. They must
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
