cases in which children or parents who contribute to the delinquency of their children are concerned. Under the topic "Immigrants," Gino C. Speranza, attorney for the Society for Italian immigrants, member of the New York Immigration Commission, delivered an address. He made the sweeping charge that foreigners, including immi-grants intending to make the United States their home, are discriminated against in American courts. He claimed that the United States discriminated be-tween citizens and prospective citizens by classifying the latter when they come to an American port into desirable and undesirable, and said that while the country had a right to do this, it ought to be done by a court rather than by summary, arbitrary and non-judicial tribunals or boards of special impury. He claims that this discrimination fol-lows the immigrant after he has become a citizen both in civil and criminal courts.

While Mannon was speaking Florentine Paquette and his son, fifteen years of age, jumped off the train, despite the conductor's warning that the train did not stop at St. The-rese. The lad fell beneath the wheels of the train. Both legs were cut off and he died a little later. The father was badly injured. The conductor and passengers had not recovered from the shock of this accident when the train came jarring to a stop near St. Jerome, and it was found that Eugenie Houlte, two and a half years old, had been cut to pieces under the train.
