THE HOUSEKEEPER

APPROXIMATE TEA SCONES: Sit a quart of flour three times with two teaspoons of baking powder, and one of salt. Chop into this a tablespoonful of butter and one of lard for shortening. Mix in a bowl. Beat vigorously for about fifteen minutes. Have thin sheets of shallow paste slightly buttered. Have ready also a tapering tin tube, with smaller opening, about three-fourths of an inch in diameter. Place this in the small end of a conical oyster pastry bag. Put the mixture in the bag and press out on buttered paper, having each scone nearly three inches long. Bake in moderately hot oven for about twenty-five minutes. Take from oven and while still warm coat them with chocolate. When cold cut open ends and fill with the following described preparation: Fill a six in bowl with a pint of rich cream, one teaspoonful of vanilla, and four tablespoonfuls of sugar. Place the bowl in a pan of hot water, and beat until light and firm, using either an egg beater or a whisk.

CHOCOLATE ECCLAIRS.

Take two tablespoonfuls of butter; also half a pint of milk and boil. Add half pint sifted flour and cook for two minutes, stirring well. Set away to cool, and when cool beat in four eggs. Beat vigorously for about fifteen minutes. Have thin sheets of shallow paste slightly buttered. Have ready also a tapering tin tube, with smaller opening, about three-fourths of an inch in diameter. Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions. By father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take the patent in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

TEN KILLED.

Terrible Effects of Hurricane at Havana and District. 3,000,000 Dollars Damage Done at Key West.

Havana, Oct. 11.—Ten persons were killed and 23 injured by a cyclone which struck Havana at 6 o'clock this morning. Property damage to the amount of two million dollars was also caused by the storm.

Little news has been received from the Vuelta Abaja country owing to the complete prostration of the telegraph wires, but it is believed that the tobacco seed beds have suffered heavily. The new tuberculosis hospital in one of the suburbs of Havana was blown down and many of the patients injured. Two of the ten fatalities resulted from contact with live wires which had blown down. The rest was caused by falling walls. The sea was in a turmoil until 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the waves washing over Morro Castle light, which is 180 feet high.

KEY WEST IN RUINS. Key West, Fla., Oct. 11.—This city to-night is a mass of wreckage as a result of the West Indian hurricane. At least one-half of the island city is in ruins to-night, the property loss being estimated at about \$3,000,000. The city is in utter darkness owing to the disabling of the electric light plant, and the State troops are patrolling the streets in order to prevent rioting.

So far as known no lives have been lost at Key West. The property loss is appalling. Over ten of the largest cigar factories are in ruins, among them the Havana-American, Martinez and Ray Lopez.

Several bank buildings were partially wrecked. Terrible havoc was wrought on the shipping in the harbor. There were over 100 vessels at anchor, and of these only a few are left, the others being driven out to sea or cast on the beach. At times the wind blew at the rate of 80 miles per hour.

CIVIL SERVICE. Examination Under New System to be Held Here.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—A general competitive examination, under the direction of the Civil Service Commission of Canada, will be held on Tuesday, the 9th day of November, and following days at Halifax, Yarmouth, Sydney, Charlottetown, St. John, Fredericton, Moncton, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Hamilton, Toronto, London, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Nelson, Vancouver and Victoria. Such examination shall have reference to the following positions, to be filled during the period from Jan. 1 to June 30, 1910, in the inside division of the civil service of Canada:

Forty clerks in subdivision B of the third division (25 men and 15 women). In the case of fifteen of these clerks, the persons to be appointed must, in addition to being successful in this regular examination, possess a knowledge of stenography.

Forty clerks (males) in subdivision B of the second division. In the case of six of these clerks the persons to be appointed must, in addition to being successful in the regular examination, possess a knowledge of book-keeping with necessary subjects.

One patent examiner, subdivision B of the second division, who must be a graduate in the faculty of mechanical engineering in some recognized university.

One assistant chemist in the laboratories of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa, Department of Agriculture, subdivision B of the second division. Candidates must be graduates of the scientific department of some recognized university, who have given special attention to the study of theoretical and practical chemistry, and who have had experience in general analytical work.

One assistant cerealist for the Experimental Farm staff for subdivision B of the second division. A man will be required for this position having some training in natural science, and some experience in laboratory work.

A general examination for positions as messenger, porter, packer or sorter will be held at the same time and places. Persons desiring to present themselves for any of the above examinations may obtain all necessary information, copies of the rules and regulations, and forms of application from the Secretary

of the Commission, either on personal application or by writing. Applications from intending candidates must be filed on or before the 15th day of October next and mailed to Wm. Foran, Secretary of the Civil Service Commission of Canada, Ottawa.

LOOKS BOGUS. Alleged Warning to Mariners Posted in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Oct. 12.—A circular was issued from the office of the British Consul, Wilfrid Powell, in this city, to-day, which aroused much curiosity. The circular reads in part as follows: "Notice to Mariners: 'Caution when approaching British ports."

"I—My lords, commissioners of the Admiralty, having taken into consideration the fact that circumstances may arise in which it may be necessary, on account of the periodical exercises, manoeuvres or otherwise, to forbid all entrance to naval ports at night, this is to give notice that in approaching the shores of Great Britain or any port of the British Empire, if searchlights are observed to be in constant operation, the naval port should be approached with great care, as it may be apprehended that obstructions may exist outside, or that the entrance may be altogether closed."

The circular goes on to tell the signals that will be displayed if the port is closed, and that cases vessels must either keep at sea or proceed to the "examining anchorage" marked on the Admiralty chart.

"In the event of relations becoming strained," the circular continues, "between this country and any naval power, it may become necessary to take special measures to examine vessels desiring to enter the ports or localities in the United Kingdom and His Majesty's possessions abroad."

Referring to the circular, Consul Powell said: "The notice should be given widespread publicity, and mariners all over the world should be put in immediate knowledge of this action on the part of my Government as fraught with the utmost importance."

"There may be obstructions in these harbors. Of course, this does not mean that my Government will declare war; the near future with any other power, but these precautions are taken in the event of any such step."

HUMAN LEGS IN SUIT CASE.

Rural Mail Carrier Makes Grotesome Find in Tiverton, R. I.

Police Searching for the Remains of Mutilated Body.

Authorities Believe Woman Was Murdered in New Bedford.

Tiverton, R. I., Oct. 12.—The finding of the severed legs of a woman in a suit case among some ashes in an outlying section of this town this afternoon, brought to light what the authorities are convinced is a case of murder. Officials up to a late hour this evening, had made little progress toward unraveling the mystery. The discovery of a New Bedford newspaper of yesterday's date with the portions of the limbs in the suit case is regarded as the most important clue thus far obtained. The authorities to-night were of the opinion that the woman was murdered in New Bedford.

The medical examiner believes the murder was committed not more than twelve or fifteen hours before the suit case was discovered. That the cutting was not done by a surgeon or by a medical student is his belief. He says that apparently a common handsaw was used to sever the legs from the trunk. Search for the other portions of the body in the woods near the place where the suit case was found was continued all night.

The spot where the suit case was found is near Bliss Four Corners in this town, eight miles from New Bedford. The locality was well suited for concealing the evidences of a crime, and, according to people living in the neighborhood, the body might have lain there for days undisturbed. Had not a rural letter carrier, George Potter, chanced to go to the spot this afternoon, Potter was making his rounds, passing along Bulger Marsh road, when he turned to explore a little path leading into the bushes.

Scarcely three paces from the high-way he came upon half of the suit case, the cover being missing. Exposed to his view were three portions of human legs partly wrapped in newspaper. Later investigation by the medical examiner showed that the suit case contained the upper portion of a right leg, that from the groin to the knee, and the entire left leg, cut in two at the knee. The foot was about the size of a No. 3 shoe. The medical examiner estimated that the woman (or girl) was probably five feet three inches in height and would weigh perhaps 120 pounds.

A large callous spot on the bottom of the foot indicated that the girl was accustomed to much walking or standing, and suggested that she may have been a working girl.

There were no initials on the case and no mark of any kind by which its ownership could be traced.
