Total Increase in New Brunswick Membership 848.

The Orange Grand Lodge of N. B. met in St. John from the 19th to the 21st ult. Among Northumberland County delegates were:—Rev. F. C. Simpson, Dorchester; John Williamson, No. 47, Newcastle; George Blackmore, No. 118, Loggieville; Fred Phillips and A. T. Ross, True Blue, No. 94, Chatham; and A. L. Bobbick, Co. Master Northumberland L. O. L.

Four new lodges were organized: Chapman No. 87, Millville, York county; King George, No. 57, Temperance Vale, York county; Wycliffe, No. 88, Douglastown, Northumberland county; Martin Coleman, No. 151, at Elgin, Albert county.

Lodges resuscitated: Johnston Blues, No. 46, Queens county (West); Dalhousie No. 108, Restigouche county; New Bandon No. 94, Gloucester county; Rotsford No. 132, Westmead county.

The increase in membership during the year was 848.

It was decided to hold the next meeting at Chatham.
The Provincial Twelfth of July demonstration will be held this year in Moncton.
The following resolutions were adopted:
Resolved, That this Grand Lodge demand that there be enacted by the Dominion Parliament a uniform marriage law for all Canada and that less than this will not meet with our approval, and further, that a heavy penalty be made against any person or persons who shall in any way interfere with such a law, thereby causing strife between husband and wife, or parent and child.
Resolved, That this Grand Lodge do, on account of existing conditions, put itself on record as strongly and unchangeably opposed to the granting of Home Rule to Ireland, believing that the so doing will tend to the undermining of the principles of freedom, truth and justice, and ultimately result either in civil war or in the severance of that portion of our empire from the British throne.

BRITISH MINERS UNDECIDED

London, March 27. The minimum wage bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons by a vote of 213 to 48.

London, March 29.—The minimum wage bill became law today.

London, April 1.—Up to midnight 63,147 miners have voted to resume work and 66,828 against. The leaders are urging the miners to return to work. Between 20,000 and 30,000 went to work yesterday.

SUCCESSFUL BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING

The most successful Bible Society meeting ever held here took place on the 26th ult. to addresses by Rev. A. P. Newcomb, secretary for the Maritime province and Newfoundland; the chairman E. A. McCurdy; and Revs. W. J. Dean and Dr. H. T. Cousins. St. James Hall was well filled. A choir from different churches under the leadership of Rev. Mr. Dean rendered appropriate music. Rev. Mr. Dean sang a solo and the devotional exercises were conducted by Dr. Cousins. Mr. Newcomb spoke of the cost of producing the Bible and scriptures in 110 different languages. The Bible in 131 different tongues, to the Presbyterians in 131; the Methodists in 91; and to the Baptists in 63. Interest in the Society work was increasing rapidly. But if the world was to be won for Christ the efforts of his followers might be still more energetic.

After the addresses were over, refreshments were bountifully served to all present by the members of the local Bible Society and friends. The collection was \$225.44 one contribution being a cheque for \$10.00. Mrs. R. W. Wm.
