rance Wants Cables.

Paris, Oct. 28-(By the Associated Press)—In French peace conference circles the foundation of an international commission for the purpose of distributing among the Allies supervision and management of the submarine cables seized from the Germans is being advocated. When the armistice was signed France and Japan had a brief interchange of views under which it was proposed that all war booty should be retained.

This point of view was not adhered to fhen by the United States, and a temporary agreement was 'reached' under which the Emden-Vigo, one of the Emden-Azores cables, the Monrovia-Lome (German West Africa) and the Constantinople-Kustenji (Rouma nia) cables should be placed under British management; the Emden-Teneriffe, the Emdenment; the Emden-Teneriffe, the Emden-Azores and Ten eriffe-Pernambuco, and Emden-Brest and the Azores-New York cables revert to the temporary direction of the French, and the Japanese controlling all the Far Eastern German

This situation obtains at the preser time, but the desire is to reach a final settlement as to the status of the onetime German lines. The sentime among the French peace delegation is that the cables should be apportioned between the Allies, Franc retaining those which she is now op


