



New Anesthetic. A coal tar chemical for the elimina

tion of all pain in dental surgery is announced. This new chemical is liquid in form, is applied on a pellet of cotton to the gum or mucous membrane surrounding the tooth to be an-esthetised or into a cavity prior to excavation where a tooth is to be filled or treated. It produces complete lo-cal anesthesia in from two to eight initiates, and eliminates all feeling for from one to six hours.
