Eclipses For 1923

Four eclipses will grace the year
1923—two of the moon and two of
the sun. An annular eclipse of the
sun, March 17, invisible in Maine
need not specially concern us, but
the three others are more or less
visible to our people. A partial
eclipse of the moon March 2 can
be seen here and in most of this
part of the world well indeed. The
middle of the eclipse will be about
10.30 p.m. but the shadow will not
much more than cover a third of
the face of "the man in the moon."
Another partial eclipse of the moon
August 26, will also both be vis-
ible here. The middle of the
eclipse occurs about 5.40 a.m. In
this case the earth's shadow
covers only a sixth of the moon's
surface. A total eclipse of the
sun, September 10, will be visible
in this region as a partial eclipse.
It will begin at 3.43 p.m. ending at
5.20 p.m. The portion of the sun's
surface apparently covered by the
moon will be a little more than a
third. The path of the total phase
of this eclipse begins in the
Pacific south of Kamchatka, and
crosses the Pacific ocean and
Central America, ending its length
of over 8,000 miles in the Carribe-
an Sea. The width of the path of
totality will vary from 45 to near-
ly 80 miles.

Bill Sharon To Go On Auction Block

Much surprise is being occasioned
by comment appearing in some of the
New York and Boston newspapers re-
garding Bill Sharon, 204½, the Fred-
ericton bred trotter, whose sale at
\$28,000 in Canadian funds two years
ago to Thomas W. Murphy, of Pough-
keepsie, N. Y., wizard driver of the
grand circuit, made him the highest
priced trotter ever bred in Canada.
After reducing the record for Cana-
dian bred trotters to 2:04½ during
the past season, he is now to be sold,
and what he will bring on the auc-
tion block at the Old Glory sale in
New York on Thursday is just now a
matter of much speculation amongst
horsemen. Locally the opinion seems
to be that the chestnut's value has
been chopped about in two by the fact
that since he was sold he has been
gelded. If he were still a stallion
horsemen in Maritime Provinces
would be willing to bid high for him,
as his reputation is still undiminished
in these parts.

One of the most surprising state-
ments by turf writers recently about
the chestnut is "Bill requires man
handling of the severe sort at times,
or at least has in the past."

Nothing was ever further from the
truth, according to his breeder, S.J.
Boyle, of Fredericton, and his original
trainer, Bill Sharen, after whom he
was named.

"That kind of treatment and the
disposition not to race him out in
front, are we believe, the reasons
Bill Sharon is not now listed among
the two minute trotters," said one
who knows as much as anybody
about the horse.

WILL NEED TRAINING

Horsemen will find it hard to

A. Bonar Law And Lord Beaverbrook

A curious relationship between Bo-
nar Law and Lord Beaverbrook has
been revealed, and which might go
far to explain the intimate friendship
between the two in British politics.
It is pointed out by T. M. Fraser in
Saturday Night, Toronto, that the
fathers of these two celebrities in
British politics were intimate friends
in New Brunswick.

"About the same time as Rev. Jas.
Law came to Canada," says Mr. Fra-
ser, "there came another Presbyter-
ian clergyman, whose circumstances
and experiences were almost a dupli-
cate of those of the father of Bonar
Law. This was the Rev. William Ait-
ken, who settled a little farther north
in the Miramichi district of New
Brunswick, but who was a neighbor,
as neighbors went in that country of
great empty spaces.

The two clergymen were bosom
friends. Rev. William Aitken had a
large family, one of whom was Wil-
liam Maxwell Aitken, now Lord Bea-
verbrook. When, after a spectacular
career in Canada, in which, as a com-
pany promoter and financier, he laid
the foundations of a large fortune,
Max Aitken went to Great Britain in
search of other worlds to conquer,
what more natural that he should
look up the son of his father's old
friend, with whom the family had
never wholly lost touch?

The subsequent career of these two
sons of Presbyterian manes in the
New Brunswick backwoods, which
landed one in the peerage after a
spectacular career as the "Bunty"
who pulled the strings to make the
Lloyd George government, and the
other in the Prime Ministership of
Great Britain, is current history.

BILL SHARON SOLD FOR \$900.

New York, Nov. 30—The Canadian
trotter Bill Sharon went under the
hammer today at the Old Glory sales
here and was sold for \$900. He was
bought by Dr. Edwin P. Farley, Ky.
The total horses sold today were 101
the aggregate price being \$66,220.
Twenty one of them brought \$1,000
or more. Walter Cox the famous
trainer paid the high price of the day
when he bought Peter Earl (2:04 1/2)
for \$8,100.

Bill Sharon was bred in Frederic-
ton by S. J. Boyle and with a mark
of 2:04½ is the fastest Canadian bred
trotter. Mr. Boyle sold the horse to
A. Alcorn of Blackville who with his
business partner F. M. Murchie of
St. Stephen sold him to Thomas W.
Murphy of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., sever-
al years ago for \$25,000 in American
funds then \$28,000 in Canadian cur-
rency. On the grand circuit the horse
failed.
