### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

MANY young men received holy orders at St. Mary's, Halifax, on Sunday, including Father McQuillan, of Charlottetown, who celebrated his first Mass in the seminary chapel at ten o'clock. He will be attached to St. Patrick's Parish, Halifax.

Mr. W. C. KENNEDY has received the advance circular of the C. P. R. dealing with cheap excursions to the Northwest. Rates from St. John to points between Winnipeg and Calgary and return range from \$28 to \$36. Passengers must leave St. John on June 3rd and 4th, good for two months. This offer affords a capital opportunity for any persons wishing to do so, to visit the fertile areas of the Canadian Northwest.

A HALIFAX despatch of the 23rd says: The last Regiment of the Fourth Contingent left Halifax to-day for South Africa. The record made by the men of this Contingent during their stay here is unimpaired. They have conducted themselves most creditably in every way and not one of the two thousand three hundred men was arrested while here. Last night some two or three hundred of the Westerners marched to Albertmar Street, demolished a house in which one of their comrades was sandbagged. They then walked quietly away.

A PETITION will be presented to the Government in the course of a few days, asking for an act of incorporation for the Westmount Poultry Association. The company will be composed of Mr. Hamilton, R. C. Goff, Geo. E. Auld, L. H. Hazard and S. W. Cable and others, with a capital stock of \$5,000, divided into shares of \$100 each. The object of the company will be to raise poultry on a mammoth scale by the use of incubators. At the present time two incubators are being operated, and in a short time additional ones will be placed. Lewis H. Hazard will be in charge.

"VICTORIA DAY" was recognized as a public holiday throughout the whole British Empire. The rain, no doubt, marred the pleasure of a great many of our city people who had gone to different parts of the country for recreation, but it was needed, and the day was happy. About 250 New Glasgow excursionists came to Charlottetown by the steamer Amelia to witness the football game between the Abegweit and the New Glasgow team. They were accompanied by the Stellarton band, which provided good music. Both teams played well, but the Bussinesmen were not in it with the home team, who won by a score of 6 to 0. The Highland Brigade of this city also defeated the Summerside High School team there by a score of 14 to 0.

An Ottawa despatch of the 21st says: The conference between representatives of the federal government and the provincial governments on jurisdiction over the fisheries terminated to-day. The meeting resulted in an understanding that it is possible to reach an agreement under which jurisdiction shall be satisfactorily divided. The conference adjourned to meet after the premiers have returned from the coronation conference. It will then be decided how the administration of the fishery laws and the apportionment of reserves can be divided as between the federal and provincial authorities. But even when this is settled it will still remain to be determined whether such compromise will require a further decision by the judicial committee of the privy council, or whether it can be legalized by concurrent dominion and provincial legislation.

PARTICULARS of the death of D. M. McPherson, formerly of this city, who was recently killed in St. Louis, Mo., have been received in the city. Mr. McPherson, who was in the employ of a transfer company, was driving along the levee. In attempting to turn suddenly in order to avoid a passing train that came upon him unawares, one of the front wheels of his wagon dropped into a depression on the levee and he was thrown violently to the pavement. He alighted on his head and his neck was broken by the fall, while his back wheel passed over his chest. Deceased was 34 years of age, and leaves his widow and a boy seven years of age to mourn. The interment took place at Mount Carmel cemetery on Sunday afternoon from his late residence on North Tenth street. Mrs. James Duffy, of this city, has received a letter giving the above particulars, from her sister, nee Miss Eliza McPherson, widow of the deceased.

R. S. LITTLE, son of Thos. Little, head of the retail dry goods firm of Thos. Little & Son, Halifax, committed suicide at the Hotel Minto, Montreal, on Saturday, by shooting himself through the head by means of a 42 Remington revolver. He had only recently been appointed teller of the Royal Bank at Charlottetown. He came to this city on Tuesday last from Sackville to take the place of Mr. A. W. Hyndman, who has been transferred to Montreal. The following morning he went to work in the Royal Bank of Canada with Mr. Hyndman and stayed in what is known as the teller's box with him on Thursday and Friday, and after tea on Friday he returned to the bank and did some work. During the afternoon he intimates to Mr. Tidmarsh, a fellow clerk, that he intended going to Picton, or possibly to Summerside. On Saturday, however, he went via Summerside to Moncton. On Friday afternoon he had his trunk sent up to Miss McMillan's house on Prince Street where he proposed boarding. After he had taken his tea at Miss McMillan's he returned to the Davies, but during the time he was there did not mention going to Moncton and appeared to be bright and cheerful. The deceased was only 23 years of age, a fine looking young man, physically, and apparently in the best of health. Those who met him during his sojourn of two days in Charlottetown, state that he did not appear to be suffering from any mental trouble, and from appearances, was the last man who would wish to end his existence. The following note was found in his vest pocket: "Physical trouble from which I can never get over is the cause of this deed." There were letters for his mother at Halifax, and his brother Fred at Wolfville, and a mailed letter addressed to a young lady in Sackville.

ABOUT 275 ornamented trees have been planted throughout different parts of the city this year.

TOMMY NOONAN, a well known boxer, was held in Boston on other day as a result of a blow in a match with Eddie Dixon. Noonan's real name was John Cassidy. Noonan is now in custody.

The Montague Rife Club was organized last Thursday evening with 50 members and the following officers: Capt. D. F. Macdonald; Secy, David Melish; Treas. Jas. H. McQuaid; Committee, Nathaniel McLaren, W. A. Johnston.

A P. E. I. photographic contest, open to all amateurs of Canada, will be held in the Y. M. C. A. this city, the first week in July. Three prizes silver and bronze medals and complete camera and an extra prize is offered for most original subject or scene sent in.

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., will hold athletic sports on Coronation Day, under the auspices of the N. S. A. A. The events will include a series of bicycling events namely, a quarter mile, half mile, one mile and three miles; a hundred yards dash, a 220, a quarter mile run, a mile run, running broad jump, high jump, pole vault, putting shot, throwing the hammer and fifty yards sack race.

FOREST fires were raging in different parts of the Island during the past week. The barns and dwelling of W. Muirhead at North Tryon were saved with great difficulty, trenches having to be dug to head off the flames. A fire in the woods at the rear of John McRae's farm at Big Point threatened great damage; the cinders, it is said, were carried over farm houses for nearly three miles by the wind.

IN MEMORY  
Private Roland Dennis Taylor: killed in action at Paardeberg, South Africa, 18th February, 1900, aged 22 years.  
Private Alfred Rigge, killed in action at Paardeberg, South Africa 27th February 1900, aged 22 years.  
This tablet is erected by the officers and non-commissioned officers and men of the Charlottetown Engineer Company in honor of their dead comrades. It is a beautiful piece of work made by Hensley, Jeweller, of Montreal costing about \$70.00.

### In South Africa.

LONDON, May 27.—A cabinet council is to be held to-day to decide upon the points of detail, mostly of a financial nature, which have been raised by the Boers in the peace negotiations. The British decision in the matter with them will be communicated to the Vereeniging conference by the delegates at Pretoria, a d being the best available terms they will accept certainly be accepted. The results should be announced officially either on Thursday or Friday, probably on Friday, the day on which King Edward's birth will be celebrated.

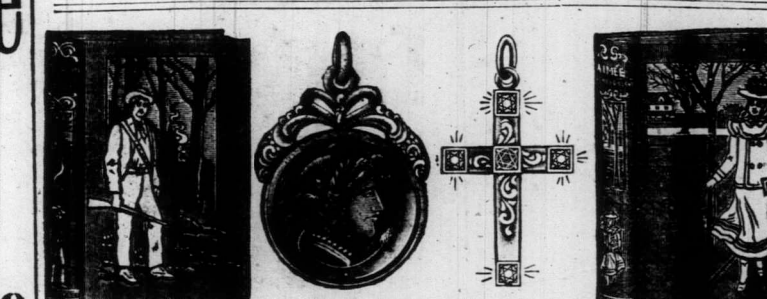
