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

LONDON, June 26. News comes from South Africa that new flying machine has been invented, which will take a prominent the prominent, place among air craft. The inventor, Shaw Hunter, of Kimberley, calls the machine an Asraeolus. It is a powerful affair, with a carrying capacity of fifty tons dead weight, 100 passengers in addition to the crew.
