LONDON, June 26.
The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times learns that, in the event of war, Roumania will take the field in support of Bulgaria.

KINGSTON, June 26.
Eight Italians lost their lives in an explosion of dynamite, which occurred early this morning at a construction camp, about 10 miles from Pucham. Three bodies were recovered. The accident occurred in one of the Company's short lines.

LONDON, June 26.
Queen Mary's adhesion to Victorian proprieties, is doubtless responsible for an edict issued by the management of the International Horse Show at Olympia, that all women competitors, appearing in the equestrian procession, before the King, Queen and President Poincaré, must use side-saddles. The announcement has awakened much criticism.

LISBON, June 26.
A violent scene occurred yesterday in the Senate. Senator Arthur Costa, brother of Premier Dr. Alfonso Costa, objected to the remarks of Jose de Freitas, and advanced upon him. Senator De Freitas drew a revolver, and levelled it at the other's breast. For a dramatic moment the two men stood facing each other. Then several Senators sprang upon De Freitas and disarmed him.

LONDON, June 26.
News comes from South Africa that a new flying machine has been invented, which will take a prominent part in the prominent place among British air craft. The inventor, Shaw Hunter, of Kimberley, calls the machine an Asraocetus. It is a powerful affair, with a carrying capacity of fifty tons dead weight, 100 passengers in addition to the crew. Length, 300 feet; height, 45 feet, and width 225 feet. Driving force is by engines, aggregating 3,000 horsepower. He claims the machine cannot possibly capsize, that it will remain in flight ten days, and travel at a speed of from 50 miles, minimum, to 120, maximum, an hour.

LONDON, June 26.
An indiscreet jingo speech made by General Count Gleichen, Commandant of the 16th Infantry Brigade, at the Lord Mayor's banquet at Belfast was referred to by Swift MacNell in the Commons, who asked the Secretary of War if his attention had been called to it. Gleichen said that Kell Hardie, Carnegie and various Peace presidents said because they had a big army they had introduced militarism. He considered that people of that sort, however well-meaning must be suffering from softening of the brain. In another version he was represented as saying that he was delighted to know that the Government was bringing in a bill for the care of the feeble-minded, and would commend to their first charge Kell Hardie and Carnegie. Swift MacNell asked if such language contravened the King's regulations, and what action was contemplated in the matter. The Financial War Secretary said that Count Gleichen had submitted a statement saying that the published account of his remarks conveyed an erroneous impression. He had expressed regret at certain references. Appropriate action would be taken. MacNell then asked if he would have been an English General if he had not been a German Count. No reply was given.

Anarchist Was Posing as Priest.

Rome, June 16.—The notorious Neapolitan anarchist, Francesco Caccozzo, who mysteriously disappeared on Friday from Naples and caused much worry to the police, who telegraphed everywhere and watched all trains for the man, was arrested on Saturday afternoon, disguised as a priest, in the Chamber of Deputies. The pseudo-priest was sitting in the Stranieri's Gallery, calmly listening to the debate when a detective noticed him and thought he recognized the anarchist. The detective stood behind the man and whispered the word "Caccozzo." Turning suddenly under the anarchist betrayed himself. He was taken to a police station and searched and put through the third degree concerning his disguise and the reason of his visit to Rome. He refused to give any explanation. The police believe he had sinister designs, as his visit coincides with the closing of Parliament and King Victor's departure for San Rossore. Caccozzo was unarmed, but had plenty of money.
