Today it is seven weeks since our contingent embarked on the Florizel, and the matter has not yet been satisfactorily arranged. The trouble arose in the first place from the dependents' pay forms not having been filled in before the contingent left. Some of the soldiers say they signed the form on board the Florizel on their passage across. At the beginning of A Request From the month, in answer to an inquiry, the Governor was informed that the forms had been filled in and had been despatched on Nov. 2nd. On the 4th the Durango left Liverpool, but they left some of the Souvenir Books of the lat Nfld. Regiment that are now on were not in her mail. The Mongolian sale at PARSONS' ART STUDIO. is now due and it is hoped they are in her mail, and that they will be to hand immediately after her arrival. These forms signed by the soldiers constitute the official authority for the payment of the sums mentioned in them to the dependents named by ber 30th, the authority for the payment is already three weeks behind the first day, and the next day is only nine days off. The only cases that have been attended to, at present, are these where dependents have day of application, the priest however, ters and the like from husbands and sons at Salisbury Plain, stating that they were making an allowance out of their pay. For instance, we are told that there has been only one application from Bell Island. The Committee are desirous of doing their best to cope with the difficulty, but the trouble arises from the absence of papers which should have been filled up and put in their hands long ago. The whole affair is most unfortunate. It is unfair to the soldiers who have left here to fight. It is a hardship on the dependents, and it is calculated to dampen the enthusiasim for recruiting which is urgent and essential. It is to be hoped that the matter will be straightened out this week-end.

#### Loyalty Pays Best.

The news that the rebellion in South Africa is fizzling out and that General Botha is preparing to attack the Germans in their own territory in German South West Africa is welcome news. The Germans fomented their rebellion and now the time is coming when they will be paid back in the territory which they used as a base against British South Africa. It is a thousand pittes that Christian De-Wet has not lived up to the advice he tendered his fellow-countrymen in 1902, when he said: "To my people I address one last word. Be loyal to the new Government. Loyalty pays best in the end. Loyalty alone is worthy of a nation which has shed its blood for freedom." It is a pity too that General Herzog has not seen fit to co-operate loyalty with General Botha, when Botha invited him, instead of sullenly standing aside. Today is the last day of the amnesty offered by Botha to all rebels willing to lay down their arms. Days past-324. To come-40 SIR THOMAS GRESHAM died 1579 aged 60. The wealthiest London merchant and financier of his time. H succeeded his father as King's Agen at Antwerp, and proved an astute money-finder for the Court in four

money-finder for the Court in four successive reigns, ending as Queen Elizabeth's "Royal Merchant."

SIR JOHN HAWKINS died 1595, aged 63. A brilliant naval officer of the Elizabethan period, who did much sea fighting in many climes, and served as vice-admiral in the expedition against the Spanish Armada, for which he was knighted.

HENRY PURCELL died 1695, aged 67. A celebrated organist and composer who did much to improve the musical service of the church. He was organist of Westminister Abbey.
