## AMERICAN TEXTILE INDUSTRY.

Gloomy View Taken of the Immediate  
Future.

Washington, April 6.—A gloomy  
view of the immediate future of the  
American textile industry was pre-  
sented at the White House and the  
state department to-day by a com-  
mittee representing 400 mills and  
headed by former representative Metz  
of New York. Unless some relaxa-  
tion of the recent British blockade  
order-in-council is obtained and Ger-  
man dyestuffs reach them within six  
weeks time, Mr. Metz declared, 270  
mills will be forced to close and 260,  
000 operatives be thrown out of work.

When the textile representatives  
called at the German embassy after  
their conference with government of-  
ficials, the Ambassador, Count Von  
Bernstorff suggested that there would  
be no further trouble about dyestuffs  
shipments if they could get the United  
States to threaten an embargo on ex-  
ports of war supplies to Great Brit-  
ain, unless interference with trade  
between America and Germany in  
foodstuffs, cotton and other non-con-  
traband goods ceased.

Whether the much wanted dyestuffs  
could be obtained, the ambassador in-  
sisted depended entirely upon whether  
the American government made such  
vigorous protests to Gt. Britain that  
they must be yielded to. England, he  
said, would soon stop interfering with  
legitimate commerce if the prospect  
of guns and ammunition from the  
United States being cut off were plac-  
ed before the allies.

## CUT HIS TONGUE OUT.

Austrians' Barbaric Method With Ley-  
al Russian Soldier.

London, April 7.—Reuter's Petro-  
grad correspondent sends the follow-  
ing: "A despatch from the command-  
er in chief received to-night says:  
'In the region of Zalesitrow, during  
the night of Saturday, the Austrians  
violently bombarded one of our for-  
tifications with heavy guns, their fire  
killing almost all the defenders. The  
Austrian infantry then attacked and  
occupied our positions, but they were  
almost immediately dislodged by a  
counter attack made by a Russian  
company.'

"The Russians found in a trench  
one of their comrades, Makuksa whom  
the Austrians had captured and horri-  
bly mutilated. Makuksa had been  
acting as a telegraph operator, and,  
having refused to give the enemy in-  
formation, his tongue was cut out. The  
commander in chief promoted Makuk-  
sa on the spot to rank as a non-com-  
missioned officer and conferred on  
him the Cross of St. George, first  
class. He also expressed to Makuksa  
personal gratitude and commended his  
case to the attention of the Emperor  
for a double rate of pay."

## ANOTHER "INOCULATE"

## AND IT'S ON ME, BOYS.

Harvard Professor Invites Students  
To Guard Against Germs.

Cambridge, Mass., April 7.—"Drop  
in any time during office hours and  
get inoculated against disease for  
nothing," is the invitation extended to  
all Harvard students by Dr. Roger I.  
Lee, professor of hygiene.

The doctor says you can never tell  
when you are going to fall into the  
clutches of the dread germ of typhoid  
and that forewarned is forearmed.  
Especially since the war in Europe  
is apt to breed diseases that may be  
brought into this country, one may  
pick up the germs in a thousand and  
one different ways. As to what hap-  
pens after the virus is administered,  
Dr. Lee says:

"The preventative inoculations are  
three, at intervals of seven to ten  
days, and are practically painless.  
Occasionally within twenty-four to  
forty-eight hours after inoculation  
there is some disturbance of a mild  
nature."

Many of the students are wondering  
just what he meant by a "mild dis-  
turbance."

SUBMARINES GET LESS THAN  
ONE QUARTER OF ONE P.C.

Statistics up to March 17 inclusive  
show that the effect of the German  
submarine blockade, though sensa-  
tional as applied to individual ships  
sunk, are almost negligible in the  
main. As the report below shows,  
the losses so far have been less than  
one-quarter of one per cent of sail-  
ings. Here is the summary:—
