In Memoriam.

IDA J. MURPHY.—(FLYNN.)

"But there is a loss—and Death and the grave have their sting and victory, and a dear loved one passes away for ever."

To her the subject of this poor obituary offering, the writer places these words immortal—

"Death leaves a shining mark," and Death, too, loves the beautiful, and the fair, and the good.

For the last several months, Ida Murphy, the dear departed wife of Mr. Edward Flynn, of this city, had been confined to her room by the dread scourge of consumption, but though knowing that the end was imminent, a splendid resignation, and calm, marked the tardy interim until death came to the sufferer on Thursday last.

They are innumerable, those who knew and loved Mrs. Flynn, and her's was a character worthy indeed of every bit of that general estimation in which she was held.

Her personality was "beautiful," marked by the traits of "retirement" and yet social dignity.

In the various admired points of the dear departed, was a total quintessence of all womanly loveliness, for there, fully developed, were kindness, nobility, loyalty and that honest devotion of Christianity—"truth to home and to God," and affection and trust to her heart's friends.

During the long, weary months of suffering (for youth incarcerated hopelessly—must suffer) the poor girl uttered nothing against a harsh fate, and her husband and friends who were continually in attendance, marvel

much at the almost Divine submission and resignation that was shown through it all.

The writer had the pleasure of knowing the deceased, and her death though not unexpected, was a sad item of news to hear, for though it is the lot of all of us to lose a friend, the passing of one whom we have admired for qualities both estimable and loving, makes a void that others may not fill or know the place of.

Poor Ida was so young, too, only 21 years of age, but commencing a life that promised to be so full of happiness and of peace—when the end came.

To her husband Mr. Edward Flynn, (a life-long friend of mine), I wish to offer sincere condolence on this severe loss that has come into his life, and there are hundreds of friends who knowing him and his dear departed wife, will, too, echo my genuine wish that "God will be good to him, and that Time will heal the wound of sorrow now so manifest." May the soul of poor Ida Murphy, too, find everlasting peace in God's happy care.—P.J.K.

Last evening's meeting of the N. I. W. A. with President Bennett in the chair, was fairly well attended, and a number of communications were received. Chief of these was a letter requesting information re the formation of a telegraphers' branch of the association. Matter giving the desired information will be forwarded. A letter from Mr. F. Morison, Secretary of the American Federation of Labor was also read. The letter outlined the measures being taken by the labouring men of America in connection with Pres. Wilson's stand on peace, and to meet conditions after the war. The late Chairman of the Co-operative Committee, Mr. E. J. Walley, reported that he had been appointed General Manager of the new store, to be opened on October 12, in the premises formerly used by McDonald's Bakery, corner of General Street. Several members who had been alluded to in the editorial of the last issue of the Industrial Worker, took occasion to deny the charges made therein. A report of the matter of putting the Union Label on the Association's paper was submitted. Some twenty-five new members were admitted. It was decided to pay the usual mortality amount due the family of the late Jos. Hanlon.

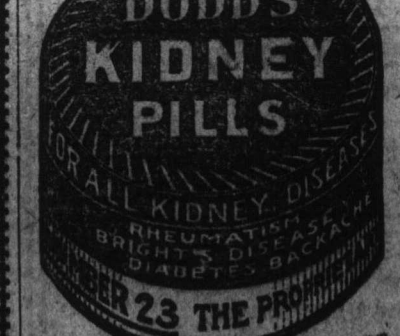
