The Belgian Legation, in an official statement to-day, announced that Belgium will no longer submit to a status of guaranteed neutrality like that which existed before the war. It aspires to complete independence and the rights common to all free peoples A return to the status quo of 1839, the statement said, will entail a perpetuat intrusion by the Germans upon the domestic life of the nation, and create a situation intolerable to public opinion, and certain to cause seriious difficulties.
