To-day the lads break camp and march back to town. The Battalion Band are expected to meet parade at Albany at 7.15 p.m. en route to the Armoury, and thus end one of the most successful Camps ever held.

The thanks of the Brigade are extended to kind friends, one and all, too numerous to mention, who helped in various ways to give the lads such an enjoyable holiday.

**Poor Fishery
at Change Islands.**

Report from Change Islands to the Board of Trade states the total catch of codfish there is 3,300 qtls. Most of the traps have been taken up but about 12 are still fishing with 100 dories and skiffs. Fishing with both traps, hook and line is very poor. A message from one schooner at Belle Isle in the Straits reports one loaded and another well fished. Codfish have slackened off but are expected to have another run.

On Board British Royal Mail Steamship.
London, July 31. (Canadian Press).—The Royal Mail steamer Duro which arrived at Liverpool recently reported that a baby girl had been born at sea. The child was given the Christian names of Marina Darra, the latter being the feminine of Darro.
The child was of Spanish parents, and although born under the Union Jack, which carries with it British nationality, the question was discussed among the passengers whether the new-comer was a native of the Argentine, being born when the ship was in Argentine territorial waters. The parents disembarked with the baby in Spain.
Children born at sea under the British flag are entered in the registers as natives of St. John's, London.
