

Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland.

FRIDAY, June 23rd.
The House met at 3.30, the Lord Bishop presiding. The opening prayers were read. The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed.

Canon Bolt moved the report of the Diocesan Education Committee for the Biennial period 1920-21. Upon being seconded a debate took place on the whole subject of Church of England Education in St. John's and the Diocese. Canon Bolt moved the motion that the Diocese be asked to contribute towards a "Thank offering" to be presented to the Society on the occasion of its centenary in 1923, at such a time, and by such means as the Bishop may deem desirable.

It was pointed out by Canon Bolt that the Society was founded through the instrumentality of a Newfoundland merchant, Samuel Codner, and that it has generously supported education in this Diocese from its inception in 1820, to this present day, but that now owing to the state of its finances, it has reluctantly been compelled to largely reduce its support. Many members of the Synod, clerical and lay bore testimony to the work of the Society's work. The House unanimously agreed with the resolution.

Dr. Blackall gave notice of motion re the Board of Directors of the Church of England Colleges.
Rev. W. R. J. Higgett gave notice of motion concerning compulsory education.
Rev. W. R. J. Higgett gave notice of motion re enforcement of Prohibition Act.

Mr. Brian Dunfield asked leave to introduce a Bill to amend Chapter I and VII of the Constitution and Rules of the Synod. Leave was granted.
Mr. Dunfield proposed and it was duly seconded that the Bill be read a first time. Agreed.
On motion the House adjourned to meet again at 8 o'clock.

EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 8 p.m., the Lord Bishop reading the prayers and declaring the House open for business. Canon Bolt gave notice that he would on to-morrow move for the appointment of a Committee to submit a list of members to serve on Standing Committee.

Mr. H. W. Hayward moved and it was duly seconded that the report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education be received. Agreed.
Rev. C. A. Moulton moved and it was seconded that the report of the Literature Committee be received. Agreed.

Mr. Brian Dunfield moved the report of the Directors of the Church of England College, On being seconded it was agreed.
The House resumed the debate on the second reading of the Bill to amend Chapters I and VII of the Constitution and Rules, relating to the giving to women the right to speak and vote at Parish meetings. After debate the second reading was agreed.

Canon Bolt moved and it was seconded that Bill to amend Chapter XXIII to amend the Constitution and Rules of the Provincial Synod of Canada of 1919 to this Diocese to join these respective Synods, which invitations are still open.

Rev. E. C. Earp seconded the motion.
At closing time it was proposed and seconded that the debate do stand adjourned until next session. This was agreed.

On motion it was agreed that the House do stand adjourned until Monday at 3 o'clock, and proceedings concluded with the Bishop's blessing.

RESOLVED, That in the opinion of this Committee the use of the grounds on Regatta Day and on all days on which crews are practicing for the Regatta should be so far as possible devoted to purposes immediately connected with the successful carrying out of the Regatta.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That in the opinion of this Committee permission to operate wheels of fortune or any like methods of obtaining money should be granted only to individuals or clubs who are directly concerned with regatta work, and that the President of this Committee communicate this opinion to Bowring Bros., Ltd.

In reply to the above the following letter from Judge Morris was read at last night's meeting of the Regatta Committee:

To J. L. Noonan, Esq.,
Secretary Regatta Committee.
Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 10th inst., enclosing copy of resolutions passed at the last meeting of the Regatta Committee.

The resolutions record the following:

(1) That in the opinion of this Committee, the use of the grounds on Regatta Day shall be as far as possible devoted to purposes immediately connected to the successful carrying out of the Regatta.

(2) In the opinion of this Committee permission to operate wheels of fortune or any like method of obtaining money, shall be granted only to individuals or clubs who are directly concerned with regatta work.

In reply I may say I am in accord with the Committee's opinion as set forth in the resolutions. The Presidents of the different Boat Clubs have represented to me that they are short of the necessary funds for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting some of the boats necessary to successfully carry on the Regatta, and I have therefore decided under existing conditions not to grant permission for the running of wheels of fortune on the course on Regatta Day except to the Presidents of the Boat Clubs applying for same.

Mr. Eric Bowring wrote, granting permission to use the course and expressing himself as being in accord with the resolutions passed at the last meeting. President Hiscock reported on behalf of the deputation which had called on the Governor, that his Excellency had consented to give his patronage to the Regatta.

As an evidence of the interest which he takes in the event, Mr. Charles had given a contribution of \$25 towards it. This year the medals will again be of an exceedingly pretty design. They will be the work of Mr. A. McNamara to whom the contract has been awarded. The collectors were also appointed and the work of gathering the necessary funds will be commenced on Monday next, and it is hoped citizens will respond as generously as in previous years. The matter of collecting funds from city citizens who derive much benefit from the Regatta, it being their big day, was considered, it being felt that they as well as citizens in general should contribute to some little extent at least, and Mr. G. F. Kearney was appointed to look after this matter.

President Hiscock very kindly offered rosettes for the members as a personal gift and he received the thanks of the Committee. The President announced that Lord Morris would be present at the Regatta, and it was unanimously decided to have him as the guest of the Committee on this occasion. Mr. E. Brophy intimated that at next meeting he would propose a resolution to have a race for young men between the ages of 17 and 20 added to the programme, his contention being that young men after passing the juvenile age limit have no opportunity of competing in races till they reach the age of 20 or over.

The Pond Committee and Grandstand Committee were appointed and the matter of having a floating stage at the head of the Lake for starting races was left to decision of the Pond Committee who will report at next meeting. After some minor business was transacted the meeting adjourned till Thursday night next at 8.30 o'clock.
