TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CANADIAN PARLIAMENT PROLOGUE.

OTTAWA, July 21.
Parliament prorogued on Saturday afternoon after nearly five months of deliberations under the shadow of dissolution between the Senate and the Commons. The main business of the Commons had been wound up in a sitting which lasted from 11 a.m. Friday to 6.30 a.m. Saturday. When the Senate met at eleven Saturday a message from the Commons awaiting it, asking that it reconsider certain amendments it had made to the Government bill to amend the Pensions Act, which amendment amongst other things made permanent the pensions bonus to war veterans. The Senate made the bill read that the extension would be for two years only.

SUNDAY A BUSY DAY FOR REPRESENTATIVE.

LONDON, July 21.
The delegations participating in the Inter Allied Conference to launch the experts report on reparations conferred during the Sunday holiday in order to advance the work so as to make possible a plenary session to-day. The headquarters of all the delegations were active and the sub-committee (about seven hours) on the problems involving the economic restoration of the Ruhr. Premier MacDonald had unofficial talks with several of the chief delegates whom he entertained at luncheon at Chequers Court. During the course of the day M. Herriot found time to visit the French hospital where he was enthusiastically welcomed by the staff and patients. The task of arriving at understanding for economic evacuation has proved complex, and although there are divergent views between the British, French and Belgian delegates, they asserted their differences are not unresolvable. This committee probably has the most difficult problem yet awaiting solution—railways and economic evacuation of the occupied territory. The sub-committee dealing with the question of the economic entity of Germany at to-day's deliberations made substantial progress. Another sub-committee dealing with the railway question has encountered an obstacle in the Franco-Belgian claim to be allowed to maintain some form of communication between the Ruhr and the Rhineland and France and Belgium.

SYDNEY COUNCILLOR KILLED.

SYDNEY, July 21.
Towa councillor Rennie McDonald of Glace Bay was instantly killed when his oldsmobile touring car jumped the Lewis Cove road and turned against a stump at Grandview, near Lardies Richmond County this afternoon. He is a brother of Roddie MacDonald the noted Cape Breton boxer. There were six persons in the car at the time, four women and two men, including the wife and child of the deceased but no one else even slightly injured.

MOTOR BOAT CREW FEARED LOST

SYDNEY, N.S., July 21.
With the exception of the remote possibility that they may have been picked up by the schooner Alice, which broke from her moorings on rum row off the Glace Bay coast during a storm and was forced to return to St. Pierre, small hope is expressed for the safety of the Glace Bay men Allan McNeil, George Adams, and Wilson Jessome, who left Glace Bay Thursday evening in a fifteen foot motor boat to visit rum row and have since failed to return. Shortly after the men left on their ten mile run to the rum row, an electrical storm broke accompanied by a high wind which eventually developed to a hurricane. In the opinion of local fishermen the boat could not have lived through the gale.

GREEN CABINET DEFEATED.

ATHENS, July 21.
After a hard struggle for existence the four months' old Cabinet of Premier Papanastasiou fell early today, when it obtained only 131 votes out of a total of 303 in the Chamber.

New Anti-Tuberculosis Vaccine.

SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENTS.

A new vaccine which, there is every reason to hope, will grant immunity to human beings from infectious tuberculosis was described to the French Academy of Medicine in a paper read by Professor Calmette last week.

Professor Calmette said that he had studied the question of anti-tuberculosis vaccine for many years. By utilizing a special bacillus obtained by 230 successive cultures of an ore spore which has lost the property of the formation of tubercles it is possible, he said, to give to young calves such immunity that for 12 months after vaccination they resist the inoculation of a violent bacillus capable of causing death in eight weeks. Similar experiments have been successful with monkeys which lived in close and continuous cohabitation with other monkeys gravely infected with tuberculosis.

Thus encouraged, Professor Calmette and his friends applied their method of procuring immunity to the young children of infected persons who offered them for experimental treatment. Two hundred and seventeen babies have thus been inoculated with the bacillus-vaccine at intervals of 18 hours in the first days of their birth. No evil effects have been observed during 15 months, but the efficacy of the treatment as a preventive against tubercular infection cannot be ascertained until after several years of observation.

CORRESPONDENT'S LETTER.

Boston Market Letter.

There are two factors which are going to have a lot to do with business conditions in this country during the next few years. One is the amount of goods which Europe will buy from us. The other is the purchasing power of the American farmer. It is worth while noting that developments which are taking place indicate that business is going to be helped by both factors.

Rather than the balance of trade with foreign countries swinging heavily against us, as was feared might happen a year ago this time our surplus of exports over imports has improved steadily, not only in raw materials but in manufactured goods. It is a common occurrence to read of a foreign concern placing a large order with an American manufacturer. A theory which has gained wide credence is that our price level is too high to permit foreign countries to purchase goods here and, in fact,

Safety First

Some Old Accident Statistics.

Every day in the year two people who leave their homes in London to go to business fail to return. They are killed in street accidents. Each year sees an increase in the number of street and road accidents, so that today more people are killed in this way than by any other sort of accident. Insurance companies transacting accident business have calculated that one out of every ten persons insured meets with an accident of some kind in the course of a year, and that one accident in every hundred ends fatally. The number of people who die as the result of accident is highest in the United States. There, out of each 10,000 deaths, 370 are violent ones. The number of fatal accidents which occur yearly in the United States is over 50,000.

Workmen Who Run Risks.

In English towns road accidents account for nearly one-fifth of all violent deaths. Next come burns and scalds. In this case the greater number of victims are children, but a good many women are killed in this way. The largest accident death-roll among men is caused by accidents in coal mines and in factories. Then comes the number of those killed on railways. The risk of drowning is not so great as is generally supposed, for out of 10,000 deaths only twenty-one are caused by this means.

The risk is even smaller for in this country only seven persons in each 10,000 are burned to death. Out of 100 deaths from fire, fifty-eight are women and forty-two are men.

The most risky occupations are those of miners and seafarers. Next comes that of motor-driving, and fourth, that of the house painter. The safest occupation is that of the soldier.

DO WE SCARE OURSELVES TO DEATH?

M. Jean Pinot, a French writer, believes that all of us should and could be centenarians. His book, "How to Prolong Life," which gives a detailed recipe for attaining longevity, says that we die young by auto-suggestion, because we are afraid of death. "Fascinated by his terrifying arguments, we tell him to tell us those things that allow themselves to be driven slowly and slowly nearer and nearer to the wild beasts that devour them."

Women, however, has robbed the age of a score of years. "There can be no doubt," M. Pinot says, "that when women follow a trade or profession, they realize more effectively the approach of old age."

Torpedo-Carrying Wonder Plane.

How It Could Sink \$6,000,000 Battleship.

What is generally thought to be the most wonderful aeroplane ever built is nearing completion at the works of the Blackburn Aircraft Co., Ltd., at Brough, on the Humber. The machine has been built for the Air Ministry, and is named the Osprey. It is driven by a 1,000 h.p. Napier Cub. It is a biplane with a wing spread of about 70 feet, and it has an enormous fuselage. Although the Napier Cub is, both in size and power, the biggest aero engine in the world, it is stowed away in the fuselage so that it cannot be seen, and the pilot's seat is actually on top of the engine.

A fleet of 400.

Inside the fuselage there are three separate floors. On the top floor is the pilot's room and space for armament. On the middle floor are the chart-room and offices, and on the "ground floor" or basement are the bomb storage and more armament. The torpedo is also controlled from this room.

The machine has been specially designed to carry the largest naval torpedo built.

It has a normal top speed of 120 m.p.h., but when in action it could swoop down at 150 m.p.h. to within a few feet of the water, discharge its torpedo, which would disable or even sink the largest \$6,000,000 battleship afloat, and be miles away almost before the crew of the ship knew what was happening.

The Osprey has been designed by Major Duggan, and a fleet of 400 such machines could be built for the price of the battleship which any one of them could destroy.
