

Easter at St. Patrick's

The Holy Week ceremonies were carried out with great eclat at St. Patrick's Church, St. John's West, on Palm Sunday an impressive and eloquent sermon on our Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem was preached by the Rev. Robt. St. John. On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday the Office of Tenebrae was recited. At each of the evening services the singing of the choir under the leadership of Mr. P. J. McCarthy was of an exceptionally high order. The preacher on Holy Thursday night was Rev. Fr. Sheahan, whose discourse on the institution of the Blessed Sacrament was replete with solid proof of the Catholic Doctrine of transubstantiation. On Good Friday the pastor, Rev. Dr. Kitchin, delivered a masterly discourse on our Lord's Passion and Death. Solemn High Mass on Easter Day was followed by a sermon from Dr. Kitchin in which the consoling doctrine of the Resurrection was vividly and most eloquently expounded and brought home with telling effect to the minds and hearts of a congregation which completely filled the sacred edifice. St. Patrick's has always been noted on festive occasions for the beauty and chasteness of its sanctuary appointments on festivals of the church. The altars during Easter Day were decorated with a profusion of choice cut flowers in which Easter lilies and white lilies, the gift of the parishioners, were so arranged under an electrical display as to produce a charming effect.
