The following letter, received by Mr. Wakelind, is a sample of the first decoy sent out:

Prison of Madrid, July 21, 1912. "Dear Friend and Relative—Although I know you from good references of my dear mother, Mrs. Mary Wakelind, your relative, I address myself to you for the first time and perhaps the last, considering my grave state of health.

Before being imprisoned here I was established as a banker in Russia, and I beseech you to help me obtain a sum of \$240,000. I have in America, and to take care of my mother, and the interest of the whole sum, and to advance the necessary funds to acquire my baggage.

Number, Size and Location of Towers Left to the Building Inspector

New Building Bylaw Follows Modern Practice in Fire Regulations and Rules
