A CANADIAN VETERINARIAN

Will Be Sent to England to Inspect Cattle For Shipment to U.

Washington, April 8.—As a result of negotiations between Secretary of Agriculture Wilson and the Canadian Minister of Agriculture, en agree-ment has been reached between the two Administrations, by which Can-ada is to have a first-class veterinar-ian stationed in England to test for tuberculosis all British cattle shipped to this country via Canada, without tests at the border by American ex-perts. The Department at Washing-ton would not agree to this. Secre-tary Wilson said, however, that if Canada would send to England agent who should have sufficient ex-pert knowledge of the subject, the United States would admit cattle upon his certificate that the cattle had been tested and found free of tuberculosis. This was agreed to by the Canadian Minister.






