## THE ELECTIONS.

Campbell and Webster are County Councillors for Division 7.

The Reeves are Sixsmith in Glencoe, Hull in Ekfrid, Taylor in Mosa, and Stalker in Newbury.

In the elections on Monday interest centered in the contest for the county council. It was the first election under the new act, and this together with the fact that voters had the privilege of giving their two votes to one candidate made any speculation as to the result of the polling very uncertain. In the local division (No. 7, Middlesex) there were three candidates—two from the eastern part of the division, Messrs. Campbell and McDougald, of Ekfrid, and one from the western part, Mr. Webster, of Mosa. It was pretty generally felt that the western man had the easiest race, and that the eastern candidates would have to strive for second place, which proved to be the case, and Mr. Webster, who also brought a vigorous canvass to tell in his favor, was carried into office by a very large vote.

Again there was the matter of party politics to be considered, and the friends of Mr. McDougald feared that his defeat was a foregone conclusion. The result, however, did not show that this influence entered as much into the contest as was anticipated, a condition of affairs which is certainly highly creditable to the community at large. It is true Mr. McDougald was last in the race, but this was due, it would appear, not so much to party politics as to the unequal chances of two candidates against one—though the fact of a candidate's residence being in a certain section of the district should have no more weight with the intelligent elector than the considerations of party.

Glencoe being the most central point for all parts of the district it was looked upon as the headquarters for receiving the returns and a large crowd of people gathered at the telegraph office in Mr. Luckham's to learn the result, and as keen an interest almost was taken in the returns as if the election was a parliamentary one. It was nearly 10 o'clock when the final returns came to hand giving Mr. Campbell and Mr. Webster as the councillors elect. The crowd then quietly dispersed. Following are the returns by divisions:—

## VILLAGE OF GLENCOE.

Interest in the municipal elections was confined chiefly to the School Board race for the reeveship was not a warm one, although the candidates appeared to be pretty evenly matched. Mr. Lethbridge, the late reeve, was up for re-election and was defeated by Mr. Sixsmith, a councillor in 1896, by 5 votes. Mr. Lethbridge attributes his defeat to his not favoring a larger expenditure for street watering.

The councillors, Donald Graham, Alex. Stuart, John Oldrieve and John A. McFarlane were elected by acclamation, the last named being the only new member and takes the place of Mr. Sixsmith.

In the election for school trustees Mr. Walker, against whom, along with Mr. Oldrieve, there appeared to be the most determined opposition, was returned at the head of the poll. Mr. Harris was also re-elected by a large vote. Mr. Laughlin is the other trustee elected and takes the place of Mr. Oldrieve who resigned a month or two ago owing to some disagreement in the board over the principal's salary, but who was a candidate for re-election.

## VILLAGE OF NEWBURY.

Duncan Stalker, jr. was elected reeve by a majority of 18 over Thos. Robinson. Councillors—Stephen Pennell, Edward Leech, John Gay and John Armstrong. Trustees—Joseph Deacon, Dr. Jennie Carson and Robert Camplin. Following is the vote polled by the different candidates:—

## HOG CHOLERA IN EKFRID.

A Herd of Twenty-one Swine Slaughtered by Order of the Government Inspector.

Several of a herd of hogs belonging to Mr. Wm. Tait, of South Ekfrid, died recently from a mysterious disease, and fearing that it might be hog cholera, Veterinary Inspector D. Henderson, of Glencoe, was notified on Monday and on inspecting the carcasses he found that the trouble was the dreaded swine plague. He immediately notified the Deputy-Minister of Agriculture, who wired Inspector Wm. McEachern, of Windsor, to make an examination and take steps to prevent the spreading of the plague. Dr. McEachern visited the farm of Mr. Tait on Tuesday and confirmed the decision of Dr. Henderson. He gave instructions to have the balance of the herd, 21 in number, slaughtered, which was done yesterday under the supervision of Inspector Henderson. The prompt action taken will, it is hoped, prevent the spread of the disease, which so far has only affected the one herd. Dr. Henderson's promptitude is commendable, only two days having elapsed between the time he received notice and the slaughtering of the herd. Mr. Tait's loss, which is heavy, will be partly recouped by the Government.
