FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

The forenoon session was not very largely attended, session was not very largely attended, no doubt owing to the bad state of the roads. The president, Mr. J. P. Grigg, occupied the chair. The first speaker, Prof. Panton, of the O. A. C., gave a very interesting address on "Water in

Plant Life."

Where do we get the water? Those on the other side of the line have tried the experiment of bringing down rain from the clouds, but this is very expensive and has been almost a total failure. Another way that has been tried is irrigation. In Colorado and other places in the west the soil is good but of no use on account of lack of rain. A place near Denver which was little better than a desert was converted into a fertile tract by irrigation. This is not adapted, however, to this country.

The great source from which we receive our water supply is the clouds.

What is the use of water?

First.—It is food for the plant. There is a certain gas in the atmosphere called carbolic dioxide which, when united with water, forms starch. Starch being the basis of all plant food, water is absolutely necessary to the existence of the plant.

Second.—It is a solvent of soil.

s absolutely necessary to the existence of the plant.

Second.—It is a solvent of soil. A plant cannot feed on anything solid. Plant food must be either a liquid or a gas. Water is therefore necessary to dissolve the food for the plant.

Third.—Water is a circulating medium. A plant is made up of a lot of little cells, and it is necessary that there should be water circulating through the plant in order that the food may be conveyed to every part of the plant.

Fourth.—Rigidity of the cells or in other words water strenghens the stalk. Water keeps plants straight. If water is witheld the pl·nt wilts.

Take a field of corn for instance. During a dry time more water being pumped out of the plant than is taken out of the soil the consequence is that the plant wilts.

Fifth.—Water circulating through the

soil the consequence is that the plant wilts.

Fifth.—Water circulating through the plant modifies the temperature.

Its conservation. How can we conserve or save the water? Plenty of rain falls in the spring to water the plant during the dry spell if proper methods are taken to keep it in the soil.

(1) Mulching is one of the best methods to keep the soil moist. Put some coarse litter around the plant and the water will be prevented from evaporating.

HOG CHOLERA IN EKFRID.

A Herd of Twenty-one Swine Slaughtered by Order of the Government

Several of a herd of hogs belonging to Mr. Wm. Tait, of South Ekfrid, died recently from a mysterious disease, and fearing that it might be hog cholera Veterinary Inspertor D. Henderson, of Glencoe, was notified on Monday and on inspecting the carcases he found that the trouble was the dreaded swine plague. He immediately sotified the Deputy-Minister of Agriculture, who wired Inspector Wm. McEachern, of Windsor, to make an examination and take steps to prevent the spreading of the plague. Dr. McEachern 'visited the farm of Mr. Tait on Tuesday and confirmed the decision of Dr. Henderson. He gave instructions to have the balance of the herd. 21 in number, slaughtered, which was done yesterday under the supervision of Inspector Henderson. The prompt action taken will, it is hoped, prevent the spread of the disease, which so far has only affected the one herd. Dr. Henderson's promptitude is commendable, only two days having elapsed between the time he received notice and the slaughtering of the herd.
