at the Courthouse to-day.—Tally one for the snow-plow man of the
Fifth ward. He got in his good work in
the neighborhood of 6 o'clock this morning.
"Hisings on his frosty pow," ejaculated
the early riser.—The hearing of the case against the two
boys, James Munson and Robt. McLeod,
charged with breaking windows, was en-
larged until next Wednesday by the Police
Magistrate this morning.—Rev. Ira Smith, of Toronto, has ac-
cepted the unanimous call of the Talbot
Street Baptist Church of this city to its
pastorate. The Talbot street friends and
the community at large are to be congrat-
ulated on the addition of so able a man to the
ranks of London's ministers.—At a meeting of the London West
Council, last evening, R. A. Jones was ap-
pointed returning officer for the approach-
ing municipal elections. The action of the
special committee which appointed Robert
Ward as village constable was confirmed.—An enterprising chewing-gum peddler
applied to Mayor Taylor to-day for permis-
sion to embellish the City Hall arcade with
a nickel-in-the-slot machine which would
distribute his wares upon receipt of the
price. The Mayor did not see his way
clear to grant the request.—Several prominent speakers are doing

with our next door neighbors. Now is the

sentative Liberals do their part, we shall
at the next elections reap a surprisingly

daughter of Mr. Timothy Eaton, of T.
Eaton & Co. Rev. Thomas Costford, of this
city, officiated, assisted by Rev. Hugh
Johnson, D.D.—The subject of the lecture by the Rev.
Dr. Burns at the Grand Opera House, on
the evening of the 19th inst., is "The
Church and Poverty, or Thoughts on Labor

ical Union and Council of Federation of

ment.The Toronto Eight Hour League Tues-
day night met and completed organization,
adopting a constitution declaring for an
agitation for the general reduction of hours
of labor. Mr. T. W. Bacon is president
and Mr. F. C. Cribben secretary. It was
voted while expressing no opinion as to the
advisability of the city operating the street
railway or of leasing it to a company, the
league desire to express approval of the
proposal to make a maximum day of ten
hours for the present for the employees of
any company that may operate the railway
as a step in the direction of an eight hour
day for all workers.Telegraph operators employed on the
Nickel Plate between Buffalo and Chicago
have petitioned for an increase of 20 per
cent in their wages. They want 15 cents
an hour for the lowest grade, 16 cents for
the second class, 18 for the third, and 19
for the highest, twelve hours to constitute
a day's work. The men have formed an in-
dependent organization and are sanguine.
If their demands are not granted they will
join the Brotherhood of Telegraphers and
present their demands again, backed by the
Federation of Railroad Employers.Eight thousand coal miners are now on a

that the struggle will be a long and bitter

in her good books, providentially happened
in the neighborhood, and, plunging into the
churning, freezing water, rescued both
from a watery grave. The horse was
drowned.**Hypnotism for the Opium Habit.**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.—Frank Edwards,
the young opium victim now in the House
of Correction, claims to be cured of the vice
by hypnotism, excited by Dr. Brown, the
jail physician. Brown is a man with
singularly large eyes and a great mesmeric
force. He determined to try hypnotizing
Edwards, because he feared the prisoner
would become insane from sheer
craving for the deadly drug. He ob-
tained such complete control over Edwards
that the victim enjoyed the first re-
freshing sleep he has known for years,
gained flesh, and lost all desire for the
dope, which had been necessary to his ex-
istence for sixteen years. A fellow prisoner,
