TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 31—11 p.m.—The storm

center, which was in Manitoba Friday evening,

time Provinces and a strong westerly gale in the

west Territories, accompanied with colder

Strathroy on Nov. 10, 11 and 12. One
hundred performers will take part, consist-

ing of ladies and gentlemen in magnificent

An A. O. F. Dispute.

In the dispute between the Subsidiary
Order of Foresters of Canada and the
United States, and the Endowment Board
of the same order, Chief Justice Galt has
continued an injunction on behalf of the
High Court, to restrain the directors of
the endowment fund from further dealing,
encumbering, transferring or parting with
the moneys and securities in their posses-

sion. The directors are Wm. Moore and
M. D. Dawson, London; T. S. Minton,
London (West); W. J. Mills, Montreal; John
Barnard, Halifax. It appears that at a
recent meeting of the High Court, held at
Stratford and afterwards confirmed by a
meeting at Woodstock, it was decided to
transfer the management of this endowment
fund from the now directors to the
Executive Committee of the High Court,
and in pursuance of this resolution the
above named directors were ordered

to hand over the funds and books
to Bro. H. E. Griffiths, the treasurer
of the High Court. They handed over some
books and some funds, but according
to the allegations of the High Court
officers they still have about \$8,000 worth
of securities and \$999.57, which is not
charged up anywhere and must be in cash
in the personal possession of the directors.
The present action is to recover all the
money not yet handed over and the books.

A Young Worker in China.

S. Frank Whitehouse, a young Scotch-

man, who has been laboring two years in
China as an agent of the National Bible
Society of Scotland, addressed a large
congregation in the First Presbyterian Church
Friday night. He was dressed in Oriental
fashion, and had quite a collection of
native idols and other curios to add
realism to his descriptions.

Mr. Whitehouse has been stationed in
Central China, far from all civilization, and
where for weeks at a time he would not
see the face of a European. Sometimes
he would keep company with a fellow
missionary for a while, but the field was
large and the laborers few, and separation
was too often a necessity. The social
conditions, customs and character of
the people were graphically pictured,
some of them being ludicrous and
others lamentable. Mr. Whitehouse is
giving a series of lectures
throughout Ontario before returning to the
Orient to resume his work. The objects
of the society with which he is connected is
to spread the Gospel in every country, hold-

ing that no barrier of nationality, of lan-

guage, of poverty, of illiteracy should stand
between any man and the priceless gift of
God.

DIOCESE OF HURON.

The Lay Workers and Sunday School

Conventions are closing sessions.

Before the conclusion of the Lay Workers'

and Sunday School Convention of the Dio-

cese of Huron held at St. Thomas, a resolu-

tion was adopted expressing deep regret
for the Bishop of Huron's illness and absence.

Mr. C. R. W. Biggar, Q.C., of Toronto,
gave an address on "The modern Sunday
school—why, how, and how otherwise?"

In the course of his remarks he expressed
his pleasure at being present at a Sunday
school convention in the banner Sunday
school Diocese of Huron, and referred to
the fact that he had been a scholar under
Maurice Belderb, now Bishop of Huron,
in St. James' Sunday school, Toronto.

Rev. Robert Ker, of St. Catharines, gave
an address on "The Sunday school as it is."

He said the original object of the Sunday
school was to reach the poor classes, and
for the first half of this century its work
was confined largely to the teaching of
reading. Gradually it came to assume
to do for the child what the parent
was bound by the most solemn obligation
to do. The exigencies of the
case justified this, but it had pro-

duced a latent danger to parental re-

sponsibility, from which there was great
danger. The success of the hold of the
Roman Catholic Church on her children
owing to her putting religion first,
while our modern Sunday school put it in a
secondary position. Much of the teaching
in them was a delusion and a sham, and
there were even Bible classes that could not
tell whether the child was reading or not.

Jonah swallowed the whale. The teaching
is shamefully defective and perfunctory.

Religious education has given place to
religious amusement. It is a question of
which Sunday school shall stand out in
the form, and inducements are held out in
other of bun-fests, sleigh-rides, etc.

There is too little time for teaching in the
Sunday school. Another defect is that the
schools are at 7:40 p.m. for
schools is that while the scholars come in
contact during the week with trained
teachers, on Sunday they meet those who
are neither qualified by training or knowl-

edge, nor by the character of their work.

The laiciest as a substitute for training
secured a severe scolding. Owing to
the fact that such teaching did not reach
the child's pupils, it drifted out and fed
upon time instead of doing good.
