TEMPERANCE PEOPLE JUBILANT Yesterday was a busy time for the prohibitionists. And they worked like Trojans. Is it any wonder, then, that when the magnificent majority in favor of the plebiscite-927-was made known that all should have been exultant. The ladies did their work nobly in this campaign. As many of the woman as were willing to cast their ballots were brought to the polls, and of the total vote 313 voted for prohibition, while only 39 were found among the minority. Of the men 2,513 voted affirmatively, and 1,814 negatively. The smallness of the aggregate woman's vote may be accounted for by the fact that a large number of them were out of town holidaying, and an

equally large percentage sick. During the time intervening be-tween the opening and closing of the polls a prayer meeting for the success of prohibition was held in Somerset Hall.
