STEAMER FOUNDERED OFF CORK.

Twelve Persons Drowned Out of Seventeen on Board. Queenstown, Dec. 27.—The Japanese Government dredger Sente foundered last evening off Cork harbor, 12 persons out of 17 on board being drowned.

THE CZAR IS WELL.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 27.—The Russian minister of the interior, M. Siplaguine, who arrived here today from Livadia, where Emperor Nicholas is convalescing, asserts that the czar is now completely restored.

REACHED A CASH BASIS.

London, Dec. 27.—The China question has virtually reached the money point, a speech today said that since the appearance of the bubonic plague in 1898, 25,000 deaths from the disease have occurred in the Mysore State.

THE SULTAN'S ORDER.

London, Dec. 27.—The Sultan of Turkey has issued an order for a warship, but it is understood that the item to that effect from the character and size of the ship ordered it is believed that the contract will involve the payment by the Turkish Government of the Cramps of about \$2,500,000, which should afford an ample margin for the settlement of any proper claims against the Turkish Government.

IMPOSED ON PRIESTS.

Paris, Dec. 27.—The appeal court has confirmed the sentence of five years' imprisonment imposed on an ingenious swindler named Goffray, who posed in clerical clothes here and last as the "Cardinal-Bishop of Washington," soliciting funds to convert the young Indians of New Mexico. Several times Goffray succeeded in celebrating mass, and once was invited to officiate at the celebration of the feast of St. Martin. Finally he appeared at Montelmar, in the Department of Drome, where he lectured to the Trappist monks on his terrible adventures in the Rocky Mountains.

TWO SKATERS DROWNED.

Norwalk, Conn., Dec. 27.—John Kelly, aged 13, while skating on the Union Mills pond at Norwalk, broke through the ice and was drowned, and Willie Hull, aged 10, in trying to save him, also perished. Other boys tried to rescue the drowning lads, but in vain.

SHOT HIS FACE OFF.

Vandalia, Mich., Dec. 27.—George Copley, a 14-year-old lad, residing in this village, went out Christmas morning to shoot muskrats with an old shotgun. At first shot, the gun hung fire, and the lad peered at the gun on the ground in a position to reload. As he brought the weapon in range with his face it went off, shooting off part of his face and putting out one eye. He will probably live, but will be badly disfigured.

PAT CROWE is an Object of Interest in Connection With the Cudahy Abduction.

Omaha, Dec. 27.—It is now known that Pat Crowe was seen in South Omaha scarcely twenty hours before the abduction of Cudahy. On Monday night, Dec. 17, a well-known citizen of South Omaha, conversed with him for nearly an hour. Just before they parted Crowe was questioned concerning his future plans, and laughingly replied: "Oh, I have something big on; you'll hear from me soon." At that time this was viewed as an idle boast. It is stated that until shortly before the Cudahy abduction Crowe was engaged in the dairy business with his brother-in-law at Albright, just below South Omaha. Mrs. Crowe has admitted to a reporter that her husband was in South Omaha on the Saturday previous to the abduction. Diligent search is now being made around Albright for a buggy answering the description of the vehicle used by the abductors.

ROW IN ST. PAUL'S IN OLD LONDON

Anti-Ritualist Crusader Interrupts Ordination Services—Congregation Cries "Shame!" London, Dec. 27.—Much excitement was caused at the ordination of 26 priests at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday morning by J. W. Kensit, the anti-ritualist crusader, who protested against the ordination of the candidates for the priesthood. The bishop of London, who was officiating for Bishop Creighton, who is still ill, stating his objection to the candidates. Bishop Barry replied: "You have shown nothing against the personal character of the candidates, and I shall ordain them."

THE PROVINCIAL REVENUE.

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 26.—For the eleven months of 1900 to Nov. 3, the provincial revenue was \$3,700,000 and the expenditure \$3,600,000. The following are the principal items of receipts for the eleven months ended with November 3: Subsidy, \$1,196,872; interest, \$250,000; serial deposit, \$16,187,490; land, \$1,129,117; licenses, \$290,940; education, \$44,233; fisheries, \$53,800; succession duties, \$216,400; provincial stamp duty department, \$70,000; provincial revenue, \$221,000.
