The directors presented their fifth annual report, as follows:

Magee, a well known meat dealer, was thrown from his buggy and fatally injured beneath the wheels of a street car at Mott and Woodward avenues, last night. A companion, Fred Yates, was seriously hurt. Mr. Magee died four minutes after his arrival at Harper Hospital. Mr. Magee was born at Hamilton, Ont., 54. years ago, and he Glengarry, Ont.

Fred Yates came here from Hamilton, Ont., five or six years ago, and he has been one of Mr. Magee's clerks for the last six months. He is about 30 years of age.

TWO PERISHED.

Hoboken, N. J., March 20 .- It was learned today that Fireman Thomas Cooney, of the fireboat David A. Boody, fell off his boat last night when the Phoenix pier was burned, and was drowned. No exact estimate could be made of the loss of life in the fire. Has the Approval of the Patrick Hussey, a 'longshoreman, who was burned while trying to escape from the Phoenix pier, died from the effects of his injuries. Besides Hussey, four 'longshoremen were taken to St. Mary's Hospital. Some of the 'long-shoremen, who saved themselves by swimming ashore, say they saw 20 or 30 men leap into the river. Supt. Mason, of the Phoenix Line, said today that it would be impossible to definitely state the loss by the fire in less than two weeks. He did not think \$1,250,000 would cover it.

SUMMER PRICES FOR ICE.

Dealers Announce Rates for Large and Small Delivery Supplies-Protection Necessary.

At a meeting of the ice dealers of London, held recently for the purpose of deciding on a mutual course of action, the following agreement was ar-

The season to begin May 1 and end Sept. 30. All hotels, clubs, grocers, provision dealers, eating-houses, butter, egg, poultry and milk dealers, private customers and hospitals taking over 50 pounds daily, at 15 cents per cwt. Retail confectioners, ice cream parlors, cafes and fish dealers, at 121/2

cents per cwt. Butchers, confectionery manufacturers and brewery agencies to be charged at the rate of 10 cents per cwt. (extra for putting in boxes). The rates decided upon for private consumers are as follows:

15 to 20 pounds daily, season\$5 50 25 pounds daily, season 6 00 30 pounds daily, season 7 00 And for every additional five pounds, supplied daily during the season, the sum of \$1 more to be added. For consumers by the month only the rates to be as follows: 15 to 20

pounds, \$1 25 per month; 25 to 30 pounds daily, \$1 50 per month; 35 pounds daily, \$1 75 per month; pounds daily, \$2 per month, and for every additional 5 pounds daily, 25 cents more per month added. To consumers taking not more than 20 pounds, four times per week, \$1

per month, or for the season, \$5.

And to those not regular customers, pox suspects and patients have slipped wanting 100 pounds or more, to be Customers wanting ice before May 1 the Ontario Government has decided and after Sept. 30, to be charged at to establish two large quarantine the rate of \$1 per month for 20 pounds, delivered four times a week; and more, according to quantity required, al-

though the prices are not materially raised, according to rates. For their own protection it was felt necessary by the ice dealers to come to a common understanding among themselves, particularly at this time. owing to the limited supply of available, the fact being that all of the dealers must content themselves with very much less than that secured in previous years. Not alone for this reason are the ice dealers justified in asking better and more uniform rates than those previously existing, but for another and sufficient reason—the steady advance of wages, and the increased prices demanded for all supplies required by them to carry on their business.

Furthermore, when it is considered that the rate for ice in London is lower than any city in Canada, not to refer to the hardships the ice dealers have had to get their supplies, the pub-lic need not feel aggrieved at the action determined upon at the meeting referred to.

Wireless Telegraphy To Be Utilized in Canada-Agreement With Marconi.

Ottawa, March 19.-Yesterday Marconi made an agreement with the government by which the famous inventor will be permitted to establish his apparatus at any Canadian lighthouse. The government contract respecting the Marconi wireless telegraphy was signed by Marconi and on behalf of the government yesterday. The terminal points in Canada are to be left open to Marconi, who is given the right to install a plant in any lighthouse at his own expense, but if he fails to do so on being requested by the right to do so at Marconi's ex-pense. Marconi is to have control of all arriving messages and the government of seaward messages. The \$80 .-000 is to be paid on the installation of the plant.
