The weather conditions here are ideal and contribute greatly to the comfort of the patient. Usually Rome reeks in sun, and the exhalation from the surrounding marshes. But now the elements are tending every encouragement toward the recovery of the illustrious patient. The sun shines from a cloudless sky and the heat is tempered by balmly westerly breezes. The temperature seldom rises above 85 degrees Fahrenheit during the day and the nights are refreshingly cool.
